Important News Notes. TUESDAY May 6. The Senate passed 93 pension bills. More prisoners tried to escape and 25 were killed. Chaffee rescinds his concentration order in Luzon. Sailors of the Chicago are in another scrape at Trieste. Admiral Sampson died at Washington D. C. Bro. Harts, the author, died at his home near Aldershot, England. Many primes killed in Clark county, Washington. Archbishop Corrigan died yesterday at New York. WEDNESDAY May 7. General Chaffee goes to Mindanao. The ports of Samar will be opened to trade May 15. A British force raised the siege of O'Keip. Vespucci's revolution in Santo Domingo triumphed. Seven persons were drowned by the running down of a launch at Toledo, O. There are many idle and destitute men in the Yukon. O. N. G. encampment will be held at some Willamette Valley point July 17-24. THURSDAY May 8. St. Pierre, Martinique, was destroyed by an earthquake. Queen Wilhelmina is recovering. Paul Leicester Ford, the novelist, was killed by his brother. Registration in Oregon for coming election will not be full by \$0,000. Thieves made four different raids at Portland but got only about \$36. FRIDAY May 9. Forty thousand persons perished in the destruction of St. Pierre on Martinique Island. The American Consul and his family are among the lost. Four American vessels were destroyed in the harbor. Lava flowed from Mount Pelee for four days and then the volcano exploded. Admiral Sampson's remains were laid away at Arlington Cemetery. Twelve persons injured, one fatally, in a runaway on mountain near Redlands, Cal. The British press objects to the shipping combine. SATURDAY May 10. More rebellions break out in Northern China. Peace may be proclaimed in South Africa May 20. The suit against the beef trust was filed at Chicago. Albany selected as place for O. N. G. encampment.
