### How The Battle Flages.

The following from the New York Evening Journal is worthy of attentive consideration. It is the duty of every American citizen to study political conditions, not for the purpose of abetting partisan politics but to determine that which is right and just, and when right stands out clearly it should receive the support of each individual who discerns it, for nothing but eternal justice will ever bring peace and happiness to the human family.

Every one can see that the present crisis is big with the political fate of President Roosevelt. His defeat in the Cuban matter has been brought about by political managers who are hostile to him in their hearts, and who are determined to prevent his re-nomination. If he falters, or compromises with them, he is lost. But he can beat them all if he remains "unshaken, unswayed, unterrified," another Abdiel of whom it can be said: Nor swerve nor, example with him wrought To swerve from truth, or change his constant mind.

The politicians are teaching the country a lesson, as well as the president. People see how the bosses are quietly endeavoring to monopolize all forms of the political activity of the Nation. From primary to Cabinet their ambition runs, as they would have their power extend. This condition of things the majority of Americans look upon with loathing. The system is fairly forcing the people out of doors to become statesmen, as was said of the English Conservatives. But a leader is necessary in the revolt against the tyranny of the machine, and Theodore Roosevelt almost seems the heaven-sent man to step into that leadership. What we are certain of is that, if he chose to fling himself upon the popular sympathies and support, and assert the right of the people to govern themselves without consulting the bosses, he could make himself strong enough to defy the confederated politicians, and at the same time render the country an incalculable service.
