## EDITORIAL

## Danger in Jamaica Ginger.

Temperance people were startled a few years ago by statements, supplemented by statistics, showing the growing prevalence of the "Jamaica ginger habit" among citizens, including many women, of several Eastern cities. Now comes the statement that from the use of wood alcohol in compounding Jamaica ginger a large number of persons who had fallen into the ginger habit have become blind. To substantiate this charge, suit has been entered against a Baltimore firm of manufacturing druggists and chemists for damages aggregating a large sum by persons who have become blind following the use of Jamaica ginger. It is a fact beyond dispute and well known to medical men that wood alcohol, when introduced into the human system causes blindness. The consumption of this deadly distillation by manufacturing chemists throughout the country has increased enormously within the past ten years and as blindness has increased to an astonishing degree in many local-option towns of Pennsylvania, the Virginias and Maryland, in which, for obvious reasons, the Jamaica ginger habit prevails extensively, the presumption is strong that wood alcohol has been introduced into the system of these people through the use of Jamaica ginger.
