EDITORIAL

President Roosevelt attacked the Beef Trust, and now the question arises, will the trusts have him indicted for assault? In all probability the indictment will be on in 1904.

Congress adjourned without giving Cuba reciprocity. There has been an expressed opinion that probably President Roosevelt will find a way out yet. This may be true but it is not likely that he will call an extra session of congress for that purpose.

Coos Bay News: The tug Katie Cook, which arrived from Rogue river, last week, in charge of Capt. Coughell, is being thoroughly overhauled and repaired by H. R. Reed, at his shipyard at Bay City.

Port Orford Tribune: Mr. Stearns, President of the Pacific Furniture & Lumber Co., and Mr. Dornor, a member of the same company, arrived from Los Angeles last week, and have been making an investigation of their timber and milling interests in this county. We understand that they are well pleased with the outlook, and that there are favorable prospects for the inauguration of other important milling enterprises, at Elk River and elsewhere.

Municipal Socialism in Great Britain

From the Evening Telegram.

Mr. Boyle, the American Consul at Liverpool, has collected facts showing a great extension of municipal ownership in Great Britain in recent years, so that now 931 British cities own their water works, 59 their street railways, 181 supply electricity, and 240 conduct gas works, so that about half the gas users in England consume municipal gas. Great Britain also, besides owning the telegraph and planning to absorb the telephone lines, has cities that own and rent houses, an auditorium for entertainment, a sterilized milk establishment, a hotel, even a race course. In Bristol the city bought and owns the dock outright, but in Liverpool they are owned by a public trust, composed mostly of those who pay dock charges, and which devotes all profits to improvements. Thus the net earnings accrue to the city's advantage; and London is preparing to adopt this system also, besides owning the water works, street car lines, the electric light and power plant, and one of the largest public bath systems in the world provides public laundries for the poor districts, furnishes flowers and plants there and in the slums, sells sterilized milk at cost to the poor and, gives municipal lectures, in addition to music in parks, technical schools, etc. Now it is also providing dwellings for the poor by compelling the demolition of unsanitary buildings and providing the displaced tenants with clean municipal lodging houses at 45 cents for one room, 60 to 80 cents for two rooms, and \$1.25 to \$1.50 for four rooms, per week. So far the city has paid \$1,925,000 for demolished buildings, \$325,825 for land, and \$732,835 for construction; but it is acknowledged that the rents collected fall far short of paying the cost.

Liverpool bought the street car line five years ago, made them first class in every respect, and charges from 2 cents for three miles and less up to eight cents for eight miles and over. The working expenditure last year was 63 per cent of the gross receipts, the net profits going to the poor rates and the reserve fund.

This is carrying municipal ownership or socialism to extremes that have been only dreamed of in this country, and perhaps would not be practicable or profitable here. Perhaps British cities do not have so many politicians, keen to make something out of the public to put in their purses, as American cities have.

Clippings from the Young Crusader.

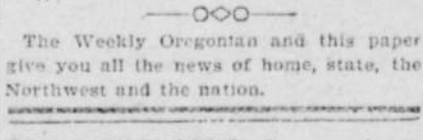
