EDITORIAL.

Spain's boy King wants to marry a South American heiress. Here is a chance for some of the wealthy American title hunters. A few million dollars, dexterously displayed before the eyes of the young monarch will so dazzle them that he will be unable to tell the difference between a Spanish senorita and an American girl.

The Spanish nobility is having palpitation of the heart over the eccentricities of their boy king. King Alfonso is but 16 years old and his subjects are at a loss to know whether he is crazy, eccentric, or just having a bushel of fun at the expense of the dignitaries. Portland Carnival Opening Day.

Opening day of the Portland Elks' Carnival will be made memorable by the mammoth parade through the streets headed by the queen and her court, with maids of honor, courtiers, ministers, heralds, pages and subjects in attendance, followed by the labor unions of the city, with floats and the Jabour Oriental show. In this section of the great parade will be 14 cages of wild and performing animals, elephants, camels, troops of mounted Arabs, dogs and ponies, Oriental performers from the far Eastern countries, including Turks, Arabians, Syrians, Egyptians, Bedouins, Hindoos, Cingalese, Russians, Japanese, Mexicans and many others. The Elks will turn out in large numbers, and Portland will look gay with this great pageant moving through the streets on the inaugural day of the Carnival.

Show Event of the Year.

Big Celebration Days Set for the Portland Elks' Carnival, September 1-13.

The event of the year in the Pacific Northwest in the exposition line is coming off at Portland, September 1 to 13, when the Portland Elks' Carnival will be given. This street fair is on a larger scale than anything of the kind attempted in this part of the country. Besides being a sort of Autumn festival, the exposition will be replete with a series of shows in connection therewith, the like of which has not been on this Coast before. Every railway and steamer line throughout Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia, realizing the importance and the extent of the affair, has made especial low rates to induce travel Portlandward during the run of the Carnival. The Jabour Oriental Circus and Menagerie has been secured for the Carnival. This aggregation comes from New York City with 100 people, 50 cages of animals, ponies, dogs, etc., and 14 Midway shows, together with a sprinkling of people of all nations to give the daily pageants that flavoring of Oriental gaiety which the public demands and seems to enjoy with increasing fondness from year to year. A glittering array of special features and attractions has been prepared. The arts and industries of the great Northwest will receive full attention. Elks' day will see delegations of the B. P. O. E. from all parts of the country. A traulod of the Elks is coming from Texas to participate in the grand parade, which will be a contest among all lodges of the principal Coast cities, for prizes aggregating \$1000. The day of the opening, Labor day, organized labor will have a grand demonstration in connection with the Carnival. Nearly every day of the two weeks' run of the Fall Carnival has been set for special celebrations. Owing to the exceedingly low rates announced, it is believed the general attendance will be large, as interest is widespread in the big show.

The Coos Bay Railroad.

From the Oregon Daily Journal. The Empire Construction Company, organized for the construction of the Salt Lake-Coos Bay railroad, is now in the hands of what may be called the Big Four, with a capitalization of \$1,000,000. The Big Four consists of Nelson Bennett and William H. Remington of Tacoma, David Eckles of Ogden and W. C. Nibley of Baker City.

Nelson Bennett is a well known contractor of this section of the country, having constructed the Stampede tunnel for the Northern Pacific Company, through the Cascade Mountains. He formerly owned the Tacoma Hotel and the Merchants' National Bank, of Tacoma.

William Remington, originally from Salt Lake, is a prominent contractor and now has charge of the Construction and Maintenance Company of the Northern Pacific.

David Eckles is the big beet sugar king of Utah. He is a millionaire and is well known throughout the Pacific Coast.

C. W. Nibley, a partner of Mr. Eckles, is the one who colonized Eastern Oregon with a settlement of Mormons from Utah and started them into the sugar-beet raising industry.

These four wealthy men will own the Empire Construction Company and with them behind it, the empire will undoubtedly be handled successfully. The construction company was organized May 2 with F. H. Alliston, president; H. S. Rowe of St. Paul, first vice president; Robert F. Hall, second vice president; Thomas C. Devlin, treasurer, and A. S. Pattullo as secretary.

David Eckles and C. W. Nibley will have charge of the Salt Lake end and build this way on the road, while Messrs. Bennett and Remington will start at the Coos Bay end and build the other way.

Indian War Veterans.

INDEPENDENCE, OR., August 16, 1902. At an adjourned meeting of the Indian War Veterans of 1855 and 1856, held at Independence, August 16, 1902, the following proceedings were had:

On motion of Major James Bruce, of Benton county, Ben Hayden was chosen chairman.

On motion of James Hays, of Corvallis, J. R. Cooper, of Independence, was chosen secretary.

On motion of Major Bruce, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with all the County Clerks within the State and ascertain the number of Indian War Veterans and their dependent widows in their respective Counties and report the same to the Adjutant General at Salem.

On motion of L. D. Hedges, the Secretary was instructed to transmit a copy of these proceedings to all the newspapers within the state with request to publish the same.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet at Salem, Wednesday, October 1, 1902, and all Indian War Veterans are cordially invited to attend. J. R. COOPER, Secretary, BEN HAYDEN, Chairman.

SUMMONS.

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon in and for the County of Coos.

Chas. Long, Plaintiff, vs. Alvin Munk, Julia Foreclose a Mortg., Munk, and Harry M. Campe, Defendants.

To Alvin Munk, Julia Munk and Harry M. Campe the above named Defendants. You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, in the above named Court, (this summons being served by publication) on or before the 24th day of the time prescribed in the order for the publication of this summons, which prescribed time is six weeks after the day of which will be Friday the 24th day of September 1902; the date of first publication of this summons being July 24th, 1902, and if you fail to so appear and answer the said complaint, for want thereof, plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in the said complaint.
