EDITORIAL

The New York convicts who refused to work, when fed upon rice, and demanded meat instead, are lying in with the Beef Trust. Well they belong together as both parties are robbers of the public.

The merging of the two great Tobacco concerns have set dealers agog and they are devising plans to fight the trust. The most complete way to put that trust out of business would be found in the disse of tobacco.

The Tobacco War is over. The great American and English Companies have buried the hatchet and are now smoking the pipe of peace. In other words these combinations have merged, to make war on the rest of mankind, and while they are taking their peaceful smoke those not included in the combine will have to put up when they too enjoy a smoke.

Orders have been issued from the packing house of the Beef Trust forbidding employees to discuss the Beef Trust on pain of dismissal. This is practically saying to labor submit to the will of capital or starve, and yet this is supposed to be a country wherein free speech is guaranteed; where if a person has a grievance he or she may make it known. Liberty where has that then fled?

The Benefit Social.

The Benefit Social last Saturday evening proved a splendid success both as an entertainment and as to finances. The program was arranged was short but the encores were numerous so that it was extended to almost double its original length. The attendance was large and there were a goodly number of baskets sold, and besides this there was a lunch counter which was thronged after the baskets were disposed of. The proceeds of the entertainment amounted to \$124.20, and the expenses were only three dollars, which left the nice sum of 121.20 for Miss Mary McGourty, for whom the benefit was gotten up.

Miss McGourty was taken to Portland some days ago to undergo an operation for cancer. We understand that the people of Riverton raised \$70 to aid in the cause, and that a few dollars was contributed from Coquille City, the result of an entertainment there.

That the citizens of Bandon responded nobly in this instance is evidence of their kindness and sympathy for suffering humanity, and they are to be congratulated for their liberality in a good cause.

Baskets brought from 75 cents to \$10, but mostly the price was in the neighborhood of two dollars.

Secretary Hay to Europe.

From the Evening Telegram. Secretary Hay has added to the already splendid record of the State Department during his incumbency of the head office there by his protest against the persecution of Jews by the Government of Roumania. It might seem that this was none of our business, but the United States has indeed become a world power, in a sense that it was not before, since the Spanish-American War, and more especially since the Boxer uprising in China and the consequent actions and negotiations. The United States, by a firm attitude, fairly forced the greedy powers to abate something of their extravagant demands upon prostrate China; and though the European governments may not openly and formally follow Mr. Hay's suggestion or demand to put a stop to the persecution of Jews in Roumania, yet his scathing indictment of this continued outrage in that petty country—and Roumania is not the only offender—will not be without avail. The court papers of European capitals may sneer at Uncle Sam's interference in what seems to them to be none of his business, but the courts themselves do not fail to heed, in some degree, what he says.

Mr. Hay speaks for civilization, for true Christianity, for humanity, for justice, for the Truth and the Right that are as eternal as God, in this matter. The world will never have a civilization worth respecting until it quits persecuting any person or company or class of persons on account of religion, race or even color. It does not follow that all persons must be treated with exact equality in all respects, politically and socially; but persecution of all kinds must cease before any nation can justly claim a respectable degree of civilization. And a nation that persistently persecutes any people fairly and lawfully within its borders—or there at all or anyhow—on account of race or religion, ought to be considered an outlaw among the governments of the earth.

Secretary Hay bases his formal demand upon the possibly undesirable immigration that this persecution drives into this country, but his real demand and plea is based upon far higher grounds, and he presents the issue to the powers in a way that they cannot entirely ignore or evade, although they may assume or effect to do so. "You created the Government of Roumania," he says to Great Britain, Germany, France, Austria, Italy and Turkey, "now it is your duty to compel your creatures to refrain from oppression." These governments say they can or will do nothing in consequence of this demand, will not notice it—but they will, sooner or later. Such a message is a voice of God, and must be heard and heeded.

The Anarchy of Wealth.

"I cannot shut my eyes to the dangers that threaten our republic. The greatest danger that I can see now is the anarchy of wealth. The Union was saved and slavery abolished by an army of poor men from the generals down to the privates. Now we see the wealth of the country in the hands of a few men who never risked their lives for the flag. The agriculture and mineral resources of our magnificent country have been cornered by a few men with money and every bite of meat we take is doubly taxed by the beef trust. If our government is ever changed from a republic to a monarchy, or Empire, it will be done by the men of wealth, not by poor working men.—From an address by Father O'Brien of Toledo.
