New York, Jan. 10.—Ten Slavs, ragged and half starved, arrived here from Toms Creek, Va., whither they went six weeks ago with 32 others on the promise of steady work in a coal mine at \$2.50 a day.

After having been hired, the men were taken to the little town of Georol, on the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, whence they drove 20 miles across country.

"These are your tools," they were told. "They will cost you \$40 and we will take it out in installments in your pay."

The men worked 11 hours the first day. At night they received 50 cents each, instead of \$2.50, and they protested. But they were told to be careful of their money as they would be expected to pay for part of the cost of their materials out of it at the end of the week.
