The town board has had the fire department ladders and the old hose cart painted up this week. H. A. Gross did the work. Morse officiating, Frank Van Luvin and Miss Lizzie Haga, both of Bear Creek. Three more schooners, the Albion, Bender Brothers and Lizzie Prior, arrived in the river last Thursday, all chartered to load lumber at the Prosper mill. L. C. Gibson finished the carpenter work on Kime's Hall last Friday, and Mr. Kime initiated the ball with a free dance on Saturday evening. The dance lasted till well toward morning and a pleasant entertainment was had. On March 15 three men from the schooner Enterprise landed near Gold Beach. They had left the schooner the day before, to hunt, but on returning in the evening failed to find her. They concluded to make shore. The Enterprise is out from the Sound and is engaged in hunting and fishing along the coast. The Prosper Mill Company have been cutting about 40 M feet of lumber a day which is in excess of what is considered the capacity of the mill. We learn that two new boilers and an engine are to be put in which will increase the capacity to a 50 M per day mill. The company is doing a rushing business, and work moves right along. The steamer that is under way of construction, at Parkersburg, for Perkins Moomaw & Co., is to be 110 feet long, 22 feet beam, and will be propelled by a stern wheel. The builder from Portland arrived yesterday, and work is to be pushed with a double crew, the aim being to have her in commission early in July. The keel is expected to be laid this week. Work has already commenced upon the ribs. Elbert Dyer has been making preparation to turn out a lot more water pipe. He intends relaying the main that runs along Atwater street and will move it back from the river. Improvement at the source of supply is intended in the building of a second dam which, it is estimated, will store up about three times the present water supply. The main is also to be extended further south on Wharf street, and also an extension is to be made eastward on Third street from where it crosses Wharf street.

The Nellie and Cressy. During the past ten days, W. A. Bingham and Lyman H. Wolf have transported their little gasoline steamer, from the shed where they built it, near the schoolhouse, down the hill, across Gross creek and the county road, to the beach, where the propeller shaft will be put in place and the vessel, then taken across the remaining stretch and launched into the river to receive her masts, rigging and engine. They have named her the Nellie and Cressy and she is a staunch little craft, being 31 feet keel, 40 feet over all, 10 feet beam, and 6 feet depth of hold. Messrs. Bingham and Wolf are the designers and builders and they constructed the vessel during their spare moments while off duty at the life saving station.

Shooting Affair at Gold Beach On Friday night March 20, a party of five or six young men were whiling away the hours in a vacant house in Gold Beach. While engaged in a game of poker, Hendrick Wilson, and Aeon Foster—better known as "Joe Joe"—got into a dispute over the game and a fight ensued in which Foster was mortally wounded. As near as we have been able to learn, the facts are about as follows. The two men jumped up from the table and clinched each other. The others present left the room and as they did so one of them called to Foster to "look out" for Wilson was armed. Foster was unarmed. There was no witness to what followed. The fight occurred shortly after midnight, and about two o'clock the Sheriff, who lives some distance away, was awakened by Wilson who said that he had shot "Joe Joe" and wanted to give himself up. After taking Wilson into custody, the Sheriff went at once to the scene of the shooting and found Foster unconscious. Everything which was done for the wounded man and the doctor telephoned for. Foster soon regained consciousness and was able to give an account of the affair, which statement will be published in due time. Upon examination by the doctor it was found that Foster had been shot twice with a 38 caliber revolver. The first shot passed through one leg under the knee joint and between the bone and cords, the other bullet entered the left side, barely missing the last rib, ranged downward and came out on the same side between the spinal column and the hip joint. At last accounts the wounded man was very weak, and suffering greatly with but slight chances of recovery. At the time of the shooting, Wilson was slightly under the influence of liquor. Wilson had a bearing Saturday and was bound over to appear before the grand jury next August.

Democratic Committee Elects Delegates. The Democratic County Central Committee met Friday at 10 a. m. in A. J. Sherwood's office in Coquille City, those present being President A. J. Sherwood, Secretary J. T. Hall and Committeemen D. J. Lowe and J. D. Foster. The meeting was held in view of the coming special election to name a successor for the late Congressman T. H. Tongue. In view of the limited time before the meeting of the state convention on April 11th, and in accordance with instructions from the State Central Committee, it was decided not to hold a county convention. The committee accordingly proceeded to elect delegates to the state convention, naming the following: From Marshfield E. E. Straw; Empire City, C. T. McCullom; Bandon, Chris Rasmussen; Coquille City, L. H. Hazard; Myrtle Point to be elected.

Schooner Libeled. From the Coast Mail. Sheriff Gallier came over Tuesday and arrested the Schooner Annie E. Snaile, on complaint of Hall & Hall attorneys for a number of ship carpenters holding claims against the vessel aggregating about \$1400. E. O. Hall and A. G. Aiken were placed in charge of the vessel. A telegram has since been received to the effect that Captain Coletrup will arrive here Friday with money to settle all claims against the schooner.

Important News Notes TUESDAY Mar 24 Ten Indiana coal companies and ten individual operators were restrained from continuing their combination for regulating the price and output of coal, by Judge Kohlsaat of the U. S. C. C. Investigation of the crookedness at Kansas City brings out the statement that cash opened the jail and let out an criminal. Fifteen natives were killed and 40 wounded yesterday in the island of Trinidad in a riot. Miss Jessie Waggoner, of West Virginia shot and probably fatally wounded a man who deceived her. The council of Chicago are trying to sub due the snake of the city. Gen. William Thomas Clark, of Washington, D. C., was knocked down by a cab and fatally injured at Chicago. WEDNESDAY Mar 25 The British government proposes to loan the farmers of Ireland, \$20,000,000 with which to buy the lands they till. The Pacific Dominion Express Company have offered \$2000 for the return of the bar of gold stolen last week, and \$1000 for the capture of the thief. The tidal wave at Bristol Bay, Alaska, last October swept away five canneries and damaged eight more so that they cannot be operated this year. Three men were killed in a dance hall row in Tuamoeua, New Mexico. The Beef Trust is now a reality having taken in all the small affairs. Several persons were badly injured in a train wreck near Elm, Mo. THURSDAY Mar 26 Frank Burns died at Astoria from eating gosh opinion. Mayor Williams of Portland celebrated his eightieth birthday today. Explorers of the Antarctic region discovered a high mountain chain which they believe reaches to the pole. Two prisoners escaped from Fort Sheridan jail by means of a skeleton key filed out of a spoon. The fitting out of Shamrock III is practically complete and her trial is set for March 28. Seven people were injured at Conny Island by a trolley car jumping the track. Two women were held up and robbed in New York by two other women. FRIDAY Mar 27 The street car strike at Seattle has produced mobs and riot. Guns were brought into play but no shooting was done. Mayor Homes has told the policemen to use guns to maintain order. A Lester Belling, who committed three murders was hanged at Portland. 30 passengers were injured in a train wreck at Burlington. The Empress of the German Empire was thrown from her horse. The divers employed on the lakes have struck for \$10 a day. Admiral Dewey says the United States navy is the greatest in the world. Intelligence of the men in the navy is given as the reason. A head on collision occurred at Gold Hill, yesterday evening and a car load of dynamite was scattered in the wreck without an explosion. No one was hurt. SATURDAY Mar 28 The city of Greenville, Miss., is under water except six blocks. Five counties in Mississippi are expected to be submerged by the rise in the Mississippi river. A bog bug's bite has crazed a Michigan farmer and an entomologist sent to investigate the bug is unconscious from a bite on his chin. 28 persons were killed and 58 wounded in a strike riot in Russia. One robber was killed and another wounded and captured at Bedford, Ohio, while the third escaped. They tried to rob a post office.
