Enforce Existing Laws.

REV. F. M. GILCHRIST. Saloonists care very little for conference resolution against their business. They have come to care very little for legislation or for the restrictive measures of the law.

The reason for this is obvious. Usually the police and other officers of the law are either in collusion with them or utterly indifferent.

I found all these conditions prevailing in the mining districts of Lake Superior, Mich. I made some mental resolutions. As a citizen I must do something.

The first step. Come what would the present laws must be respected and obeyed. After arousing our church, a committee of five was appointed to wait on the mayor and chief of police, and demand the enforcement of our laws.

The second step. We organized and secured a number of copies of the liquor laws. We studied them until we became familiar with their provisions.

We were very careful about correct testimony. The hour and day, and all facts of violation were carefully noted, and, as far as possible, at the time let saloonists know of our presence.

The result. People all over this northern peninsula of Michigan are taking courage. Our preachers and people are inaugurating an active campaign against the saloons.

Our city is now quiet on Sundays. The saloons are no longer the "power" they once were.

But you will need to count the cost. Be willing to suffer in person (as we have), in purse, or any other way. Trust in God. Seek his guidance.
