EDITORIAL

The changes wrought in municipal government in the different cities in the state of Ohio can hardly be attributed to party gains in any particular case, from the fact that in the whole number of changes from Democratic to Republican control and vice versa the gains and losses are nearly balanced, and must have been the result of corrupt or extravagant government rather than partisan gains.

Honorable Binger Hermann was nominated for congressman, by the Republican convention, at Eugene, last Thursday night, after a prolonged session of twelve hours. There was opposition sufficient to have defeated Mr. Hermann, but those opposed to him could not agree among themselves until it was too late. Hermann has always been a sturdy worker for Oregon's benefit, but it is doubtful whether he can carry his district by the usual majority, as there seems an element of opposition within his own party that is not inclined to vigorous exertion in his behalf.

Telegram: Tom Johnson and Sam Jones were re-elected Mayors of Cleveland and Toledo, O., yesterday, while Ingalls, the Democratic and fusion candidate in Cincinnati, though a railroad magnate, was beaten by a very large majority. There is nothing particularly significant about the municipal elections held yesterday in several Eastern states except the large socialist vote, with wise management and leadership, the socialists might make quite a big showing next year.

Roseburg Review: Major L. D. Kinney and C. S. Whitcomb left today for Coos bay to look after their land and railroad interests there. Ralph Green and another employ left this morning for Remote to investigate conditions and look after the surveying outfit left there last November by the railroad surveyors. We understand it is now the intention to put a new course of engineers in the field in a very short time to complete the location of the line, from where the work was left off last fall in the canyon beyond Camas valley, over to some point on the Southern Pacific. That part of the work will perhaps be completed between now and July 1st, of the present year. A busy season seems assured for Douglas and Coos counties this year.

Socialist Victory in Montana

The local socialists are feeling happy over the following telegram that announces a success for their cause in Montana, says the Portland Telegram: "Butte, Montana, April 9.—Socialists elect Mayor, Treasurer, Police Magistrate and three out of six Aldermen at Anaconda.
