Admiral Is Thankful.

SALEM, Or., May 19, Governor Chamberlain today received from Admiral Clark, formerly of the Oregon, the following letter thanking the people of his state for the sword presented to him.

"United States Naval Home, Philadelphia, Pa., May 11, 1903.—Hon. George E. Chamberlain, Governor of the State of Oregon.—Dear Sir: Your very kind letter which affected me deeply by its allusions to my services and to the feeling of the people of Oregon towards me, came duly and the sword came today.

"I wish I could express to you, to the presentation committee, to the contributors and to the people of Oregon, the gratitude I feel for the beautiful sword that has been presented to me and for the great honor thereby conferred. It is deepened by the thought that in all this, and through me the services of my companions, the officers and men of the Oregon have been signally recognized.

"As a tribute to the people who must have had an abiding affection for the name of their state I will add that neither tropic heat, where greater hardships were welcomed for the supply of fresh water for the boilers could be maintained, nor the official notification of a superior force that should be avoided nor the permission authorizing delay in Brazilian port, checked the full speed progress of the Oregon, for it seemed more than probable that the Spanish fleet was bound for the West Indies and that the need of the Oregon in home waters could be so great that the risk of an encounter on the way should be run.

"At the battle of Santiago, after the fiercely attacked and severely punished Spanish ships had broken through our line and passed to the westward of all but the Brooklyn, the Oregon rushed past the other battleships and sought close action, first with the Maria Teresa, then with the Oquendo, then with the Vizcaya, and finally with the Colon. And as each in succession turned from her to the beach, pushed on to engage the next ahead, until all were destroyed.

"On June 10, 1898, the Oregon and the cruiser Marblehead covered the landing at Guantanamo, the first port sized and held in Cuba. The headland then occupied is now regarded as the key of the naval stronghold about to be established by our country in the West Indies.

"It seems fitting here to recall the great peril in which the Oregon was placed on the Coast of China, when the Secretary of the Navy, in his cablegram to the commanding officer, called her the Constitution of the modern Navy—also to the fact that the American portion of the garrison at Pekin, was mainly drawn from the marine guard of the Oregon, and that it has been reserved for her to prove lately that an American battleship can encounter and survive a hurricane.

"With genuine pride in the thought of the friends I have made, as well as those I have known in Oregon, and with the highest esteem, I am, sir, very respectfully yours, C. E. CLARK, Rear-Admiral U. S. N.

W. C. T. U. COLUMN.

The next W. C. T. U. meeting takes place Tuesday, at 2:30, P. M., at the M. E. Church.

Mr. A. Chamberlain has been inquiring into the condition of slum life in Birmingham, England. Those who have given way to drunkenness will not spend their money on house rent. Slum conditions lead to drunkenness, and drunkenness leads to the creation and toleration of slum conditions.

Temperance Meeting.

The following notes on Mr. Crane's meeting have been kindly furnished by one who was present: On Wednesday evening W. A. Crane, the Gospel Temperance Evangelist addressed one of the largest crowds that ever was in the M. E. Church.

This was Mr. Crane's second lecture in this city and at both times the house was filled and people turned away. At the first meeting there were 110 pledges signed, and at last evening's meeting about 60, most of them young men. Today blue ribbons can be seen on many young men in town.

At the school house when the pupils were lined up to enter the school building a great number of the young men and boys had blue ribbons on their coats.

Mr. Crane chose for his subject Wednesday evening, "Some things I have seen in the slums of a great city," and he handled his subject in masterly and pleasing manner. In the course of his remarks he gave what he called an honest sign to place over the saloon, as follows: "Banks of Lousing—Open at all hours, Nothing taken on deposit but good money. Nothing paid back but disgrace, degradation and death. An extra dividend of delirium tremens given to old depositors.

While fighting the saloon business, Mr. Crane does not attend the saloon keepers. For this he has been subjected to some criticism, but he seems inclined to proceed on original and independent lines in accomplishing his work.

He expresses a preference for using the lever of love, rather than the club of abuse in bringing people into line for the good of the community.
