M. D. Landis Captured.

SALEM, Or., June 6.—Governor Chamberlain upon information of District Attorney George M. Brown yesterday issued a requisition upon the Governor of the Indian Territory for the return to this state of M. D. Landis, who is held as a fugitive from justice in the town of Collinsville, Cherokee Nation, and is wanted in Coquille city, Coos County, to answer to the charge of murder in the first degree.

Landis is accused of having on May 23, 1901, laid in wait for one Jesse B. Eudaley, shot and killed him for his money and then buried him. When the dead man's body was discovered and Landis was suspected he fled. Sheriff Stephen Gallier was appointed state's agent to serve the requisition and bring the accused man back to justice.

The situation in Turkey is very grave. According to a writer in the New York Sun, most of the four hundred persons killed during the disturbances in Salonica, following the dynamite explosions, were Bulgarians and Macedonians who were shot down by Turkish soldiers. The Sun writer says: "There seems to be reason to believe that the blowing up of buildings throughout the city was the work of the Bulgarian revolutionary committee, its purpose being to provoke the soldiers to savage measures of retaliation. The statement is constantly repeated from the best sources that most of the disorders in Macedonia can be traced to the sinister ingenuity of the revolutionists. They seem to be acting on the theory that relief from the rule of the Turk can be had only by creating such a situation that Russia and Austria will be forced to intervene. To further their cause they are desperate enough to sacrifice their own people, to shed the blood of the innocents, if good may come of it. The Turks are nothing loath to revenge themselves, and the Porte seizes the opportunity to appeal to the powers to restrain the revolutionary committee, and to plead that it is impossible to carry on reforms while the country is rent with disorders."

Destructive Cloudburst.

SPARTANBURG, S. C., June 6.—Before the waters of a mighty flood, Paoclet S. C., has been swept from the map and the great cotton mills of Spartanburg and Clifton, S. C., have been wiped out by a storm which struck this part of the country late last night.

Up to the present hour it has been impossible to ascertain the loss of life. Six bodies have already been seen drifting down the stream. It is possible that many workers in the mills have gone down before the current. Paoclet and Clifton are situated in the defiles of two valleys, between lofty ranges of hills. Most of the homes of the workmen are located in the valley near the mills in which they are laborers.

The shadow of the storm settled over Spartanburg last night. It gathered force until the proportions of a giant cloudburst were reached, when the downpour from the clouds swept away the dams, which in turn settled into one vast swirling stream which rushed down the valley where the mills are situated. At this hour (6:01 P. M.) the waters are roaring above houses and homes, where yesterday the spindle and the loom were at work and a thousand laborers were busy. It is estimated that the property loss will reach \$2,000,000.

At Paoclet the following damage has been reported: Mill No. 1 has been washed away completely; mill No. 2 is totally destroyed. The dams of three mills are swept away; the warehouse of mill No. 1, with its total stock of goods and cotton, was swept away, while the hotel, the leading churches and almost every building in the little city has been partially or wholly destroyed.

Mill No. 3 at Paoclet has been destroyed and Clifton mill No. 1 and the Gleadale at Clifton are reported to be totally ruined. Wire communication with that section is interrupted. Victor Montgomery is the owner of the Paoclet mills at Spartanburg and that at New Holland, Ga., which was so seriously crippled by the tornado near Gainesville last Monday.

Telegram: Governor Chamberlain is in receipt of a letter of inquiry concerning a family of two parents and thirty children, including ten pairs of twins, who started afoot from New York to Oregon sixty-five years ago. They did not arrive if they had, and the children were as much opposed to "race suicide" as their parents, Oregon would have a much greater population than it has.

The Saloon as a Political Power.

SENATOR A. J. COLQUITT.

Speaking in the popular acceptance of the phrase, "effect of the saloon in politics," I am prepared to say the effect is evil and evil continually. In the very first place, it is preposterous that such a grossly sensual agency will find any affinities in things noble and of good report? As we find the examples before our eyes, everywhere and at all times, the appeals of the whiskey influence are directed to the worst parts of our constituency.

The bitterly malign power of the saloon has made this class what it is and it is the pleasure and interest of the "saloon" to keep it in its degraded estate. Bribery is at all times a vile and destructive agency and utterly intolerable. But in some of its aspects it may be only comparatively detestable.

You may bribe a man with gold, or honors, or office, and we pass this form of the crime with more or less reprobation. But to influence the voter by holding to his lips the cup of drunkenness is, beyond all comparison, the lowest form of bribery. The saloon, subsidizing any party that will accept its alliance, brings into the fray a fearful power. This has been seen in many of our communities, and in some of our states an oath is exacted of every representative-elect to the legislature, that his election has not been secured by either bribery or treating. The discrimination need not have been made, as the two things are about the same.

How can this age, with all its lights and its amazing responsibilities, longer debate and wrangle over so obvious a fact as that the saloon is one of the most harmful and abominable of all the degrading influences ravaging society, and that this influence must be extinguished.

It is bad enough, in all conscience, to stand by and witness the wrecks of honor, talent, and domestic happiness that it is striving all over our land; but when we witness the fact that this base power is invading the precincts of the elective franchise, that it is aspiring to make and unmake laws, and set up and pull down the men who are to enforce the laws, it behooves every one of us, pretending to a love of his race or his country, to see to it that the menace of this shocking evil shall be tolerated no longer.
