Sunday's game at Marshfield between the team of that place and the North Bend nine resulted in another victory for North Bend in a score of 6 to 3 runs. Murder on a Sultide. On Saturday, of last week, news reached here of a frightful tragedy enacted on Elk River, Curry county, in which Henry Keller shot and killed his wife and then ended his own existence. Keller and his wife, so it appears, had trouble over the attention a young man named Adolphsen had been paying to Mrs. Keller and a separation had taken place. Then on Friday Keller had gone to his wife and the two had come to an agreement and started for home, and on passing the mill on Elk River, Mrs. Keller had stopped on some errand while her husband was to wait for her some distance ahead. Keller waited but his wife did not come. He finally went to a neighbor's house and stayed all night. The next morning his wife came along riding on Adolphsen's horse. Keller chid her for not coming as she had agreed to do, she giving as the reason that there was a dance at the mill and the folks there would not let her come. It seems that they started on and what followed was gleaned from a couple of men ahead of them, who were driving teams, A. C. Carey being the foremost of the two. The man immediately in front,

whose name we could not get, heard the couple quarrelling, then it seems Keller pulled his wife off the horse and the men heard a noise behind them, and on looking back saw the woman running from Keller, who shot her in the back. Carey grabbed a rock and ran back, but Keller raised his revolver and stopped him, but a moment or two later raised the gun to his own head, fired and fell dead. Mrs. Keller died almost immediately after being shot. One of her hands was powder burned and it is supposed that she knocked or pushed the gun aside at the first attempt. The funeral took place at Port Orford, on Sunday, and was very largely attended. Those having it in charge desired to bury both in one grave, but Mrs. Keller's mother would not agree to it and they were put in separate graves, the body of Mrs. Keller being borne to the cemetery at the head of the procession, and the remains of Mr. Keller at the rear end. Important News Notes. Tuesday July 21. Three masked men held up a saloon in Tacoma. They wounded one man and secured about \$40. A battle took place at Eddyville, Iowa, between the city marshal and some horse traders, in which one man was fatally, and several other persons severely wounded. Toronto, Ontario, had a riot. The Canadian Foundry company imported men to break a strike, and the strikers attacked the strike-breakers. A severe earthquake shock was felt throughout the Island of St Vincent, W. I. Two men were killed and several severely injured by the collapse of a bridge at Vancouver, B. C. Jake Green, a negro, was lynched at Pine Bluff, Arkansas, for assault upon a 13 year old girl. Wednesday July 22. Nine out of 12 persons who ate raw clam at a shore dinner at Bridgeport, Conn., contracted typhoid fever as a result. An old man and three children, two 7 and the other 9 years old, drowned at Sparta, Tenn., by a boat capsizing. The statue of Henry Clay, in Lexington Cemetery, Ky., lost its head and an arm by a bolt of lightning. William Laid of Knoxville, Iowa, shot and killed his 16 year old son for not getting up when called. He tried to kill a second son and then killed himself. Since July 4, ten deaths from lockjaw have resulted in Cleveland, Ohio, from slight wounds made by toy pistols. Six persons were drowned by a collision of a steamer and a brig near Eastbourne, England. A hundred thousand dollar mill was burned at Aberdeen, Wash. Thursday July 23. The government forces have beaten the rebels and are in possession of Ciudad, Venezuela. The volcano Soufriere is in an unquiet state again. Two men were killed and three injured by the bulging walls at an Anaconda smelter. Utah experienced an earthquake. The severest shaking took place at Ogden, and lasted about 10 seconds. A four-month old child, at Eugene, Oregon, walked and talks. Mrs. Ella Smith, of Honna Honna, Washington was drowned in trying to save her two little daughters from drowning in Hood canal. Another woman who went to the rescue was drowned also, making the fourth victim. Three persons dead, 100 injured, 50 families homeless, and \$300,000 worth of property destroyed in Patterson, N. J., as a result of yesterday's tornado. Friday July 24. Two women were shot from ambush near Lake city, Colorado. One was fatally and the other seriously wounded. Americans have bought the old curiosity shop in London, immortalized by Dickens, and will move it to New York. The Omaha Packing Company, lost two buildings by fire valued at \$150,000. Henry Root is chosen president of the Lewis and Clark Exposition Board. 1500 killed or wounded was the outcome of the battle of Ciudad, Venezuela. A bather was drowned in Salt Lake by being driven from shore by the wind. Saturday July 25. A Chicago watchman shot and killed one of three burglars who attacked him. He was badly beaten by the thieves before he arrived. The other two fled. Good Templars in State Convention at Bellard, Wash., have decided that a Good Templar cannot drink wine at Sacrament. He must take bread only, which they say, will do just as well. The Mongolia, the second largest steamer built in the United States, was launched at Camden, N. J. Two trains collided near Hutchinson, Kansas. Two persons were fatally injured and a score of others received severe injuries. Soto's German Castle, at San Francisco, was destroyed by fire. Tacoma had \$125,000 fire today. Thirteen persons were injured in a St. Louis street car collision the carelessness of a motorman. The Eastern half of the country is sweltering under excessive heat. Monday July 27. Fourteen convicts escaped from Folsom Prison, Calif. They stabbed two guards fatally. Poses and Millis are after them. Edwin S. Hooley & Co. failed in New York. No statement out.
