A New Station.

The Southern Pacific Company has built a large and commodious station at Fair Grounds, which will be appreciated by the traveling public. The new station is very neat and attractive, and fills a long-felt want. The management of the state fair feels particularly pleased over the new station and they say that it is a good attraction for the fair.

The Passing of Lorenzo D.

Major Lorenzo D. Kinney's Great Central railroad project and allied land corporations within the past week have met with a serious set-back, confining, without a question the Sun's previous assertions that it was a "hot air" scheme from start to finish. Saturday the time elapsed on this enterprise's second payment on its anticipated purchase of the Centerville property from the Finagun Estate, and the notice was given them of their forfeiture and to quit the premises. This land was by far the most important that the Great Central had an option on. Of the purchase price, \$50,000, the sum of \$13,500 had been paid down, and it is quite sure that to again get a legal hold on what was to be the terminus of the hot air line, the managers will have to put up considerably more money. The defaulting of the Great Central in this matter will be received without surprise as it was expected all along.—*Marshfield Sun.*

The State Fair.

No time in the history of the Oregon state fair has there been such a good feeling among the agricultural classes towards the success of the fair as exists at the present time. Every section of the state seems to be taking an interest in the fair and promises to give it their hearty support. Eastern Oregon for the first time has promised one or two county exhibits, consisting of agricultural products, while the southern portion of the state will also be represented by a comprehensive exhibit of its agricultural products. Live stock from all over the state is being prepared for this year's fair.

There are reasons for this awakening of the people to the support of the fair. One is, the management has worked hard and faithfully to make the fair as broad as the state itself. The transportation companies have come to their assistance and made very liberal rates on hauling exhibits of all kinds. Another is, the people are beginning to realize that it is their duty to let the outside world know of the wonderful resources of our state, and believe that the state fair is the proper place to meet the better class of home-seekers. This will make the fair doubly valuable. It will give those who are looking for homes on the Pacific coast an opportunity to see in a body what our state can produce, and where it is produced, without traveling all over the state at great expense. It will also give the exhibitor the best possible opportunity of showing his products, whether it be grains, grasses, fruits, vegetables or live stock.

Anarchy Taught by Example

What The "Well-to-do Rich People" of Chicago Have Been Doing.
When a rich and powerful corporation, enjoying the privileges of performing a public service at high rates of compensation is not content with a profit of a million dollars a year, but seeks by unlawful means to double or treble its annual receipts, that corporation is teaching anarchy by example.
When a merchant occupies one of the principal thoroughfares of the city as a private shipping yard, and subjects all passersby to great incertitude, loss and delay, that merchant is teaching anarchy by example.
When a corporation, or group of corporations, organize the legislature of Illinois for purposes of public plunder, the persons responsible for that organization are teaching anarchy by example.
When men corrupt and debauch the city council to get from it exclusive and profitable privileges, they are teaching anarchy by example.
Men who, as private individuals or as members of a corporation, have been teaching anarchy in the manner described may arise at the meeting of social or reform organizations and denounce lawlessness, as practiced by the "lower classes," but their words will fall on unsympathetic ears. They will not gain the confidence of the community through hypocritical pretenses. They must practice what they preach. Talk is cheap. Actions are louder than words.
The well-to-do rich people of Chicago who have exploited the community for all it is worth during the last twenty five years have much to answer for. They have set the example for lawlessness, of disregard for the welfare of their fellow-citizens, and of callous indifference to righteous public opinion. If some men of less wealth and inferior social standing and influence shall "better their example," those who took the first step in the direction of abusing public confidence and trespassing on private rights need not complain.—*Chicago Tribune.*
