Bandon's winning tally came in the 7th inning with two men out. Important News Notes. THURSDAY Aug 4 Cardinal Sartio, of Venice, was elected Pope, today, and assumes the name Pius X. White-coppers killed one Negro and fatally wounded another, in Tennessee. No cause is given for the killing. Many of the Southerners victims are in a miserable condition, and relief that was subscribed has been held back. A drunken man at Pony, Montana, killed one man and fatally wounded another one. A robber bound and gagged a girl at Vancouver and tortured her until she revealed where the valuables were kept. He secured \$50 and other valuables. The girl who kept house for her father, was alone. The run of Chinook salmon in the Columbia beats all former records. WEDNESDAY Aug 5 It has been determined that congress has no power to act in the matter of preventing child labor in factories, and that states alone can move effectually in the matter. A La Crosse wind storm blew a steamboat under a bridge dismantling it. The growing grain was all blown down and much damage done in that part of Wisconsin. Simon Booker and wife were murdered by Tennessee moonshiners because they supposed them their enemies. The wedding of Commander Stuart, of the navy, was barred on Long Island. A servant perished in the fire. Sharp & Bryan, a big New York firm has suspended business. An explosion at the Nitro Glycerine Works near Blifton, Ind., killed four persons and wrecked the works. THURSDAY Aug 6 Andrew Carnegie has given \$2,500,000 to his native town in Scotland. Burglars stole a safe from a Seattle hotel, rolled it down a hill into the street and blew it open. They were frightened away by the gathering crowd before securing the contents. A Canton, Ohio, bank teller is \$22,000 short in his accounts. Frank Masters, an expert swimmer from Brooklyn, N. Y., rescued his mother from drowning in the surf at Cony Island then entered the surf again and drowned, being pulled down by the undertow. Fears of a big smash has again disturbed the N. Y. stock market. Firebugs started three fires in Ashland, Oregon, last night. Property valued at \$50,000 was destroyed. Oregon has 2159 schools employing 3914 teachers. \$4000 reward is offered to induce discovery of the party or parties who have been trying repeatedly to wreck trains in Montana by the use of dynamite. FRIDAY Aug 7 Twenty three persons, an elephant and two camels were killed by the collision of two parts of a circus train at Durand, Mich. A dozen other people were injured. The air-brake refused to work. Two children at play in an express wagon were drowned in New York, by the wagon getting beyond their control and running into a creek. Michael Kerrin languishes in a New York jail to pay a fine of seven dollars and costs, for assault, after traveling 2600 miles to whip his man. Kosciusko fired into a crowd of strikers at Kieff, killing two and wounding 24. Incendiaries in San Francisco, attempted to fire China Town. The Phoenix Glass Works, at Monaca, Pa., will sue strikers for damage caused the company by the strike. J. W. Sayer of Seattle who is racing around the world will make the trip in 65 days if no delays occur during his race across the Atlantic. SATURDAY Aug 8 A trial of Prof. Langley's flying machine on the Potomac river developed a speed of 40 miles an hour. A flight of 400 to 600 yards was made before the machine came down into the river and went to the bottom. It was recovered but considerably damaged. General Miles retired and Lieut. General S. B. M. Young became temporary General of the Army. The revolutionary spirit is growing in Macedonia. Charles Gould and his wife were thrown from their automobile at New York and may both die from their injuries. Young Gould is a son of the millionaire car-corporation manufacturer. A Missouri postmaster is in jail at St. Louis, charged with being \$10,000 short in his accounts. Two Astoria boys, 11 and 10 years old purchased a gun and went after large game, two horses, two heifers and a bull were bagged and it is not certain that all the reports are in. A planing mill and lumber yard was destroyed by fire at Gour Village. MONDAY Aug 10 Rowan has done a lot of important-reparation from Turkey for the assassination of the Russian consul.
