Bandon's Percent Raised Up Another Notch. For the fifth straight game Bandon team defeated the Coquille team last Sunday, at Coquille City, in one of their usually interesting games of base ball. Both teams had with them quite a large assortment of "fire-works," and the sky became greatly illumined with their different and brilliant colors. The Bandonians opened their display in the first inning with four large hair raising "crackers" which resulted in three tallies and much applause from the spectators, who, at the end of the display, were obliged to concede that Bandon had the best of it, as she had to her credit fourteen large crackers to Coquille's nine. DETROIT, Aug. 15.—A special to the Free Press from Mendon, Mich., says: A large meteor which fell here last night destroyed a portion of the bridge over the St. Joe River. It buried in the earth and made a hole nearly 20 feet deep. It gave forth a screeching sound as it passed through the sky, and struck the earth with a screech that was heard many miles.

Important News Notes

THURSDAY Aug 11 A frightful calamity occurred in an underground railway in Paris, by which over one hundred passengers were suffocated or burned to death. One train was pushing another which had a damaged motor; both got on fire and a third ran into the fiery obstruction. A train was wrecked near Sedalia, Mo., by the rails spreading. Twenty-one passengers were hurt, many being seriously injured. A cyclone in Martinique tore up trees, unroofed houses, and killed many people. Sheriff Koese gave up the chase after the Folsom convicts. Will and Sam Martin, outlaws of Oklahoma, were killed by a sheriff's posse. Firebugs kindled two fires in Portland during the night. Byron Burns of Grant's Pass, Oregon, had his skull crushed by a ball while playing with his companions a few days ago. WEDNESDAY Aug 12 Musselmanns are said to be preparing for another slaughter of Christians. Turkish soldiers killed 150 revolutionists at Sorvict. Difficulties between Brazil and Bolivia have been overcome. Brazil takes Acre and pays indemnity of the expedition. Grand Rapids, Michigan, suffered to the extent of \$100,000 by fire. In a riot at Kief last Thursday, 60 strikers were killed. Russia is having her share of strife and disaster. The Folsom convicts are supposed to have reached Devil's Basin. Fire fiends attempted to burn the entire business part of Albany, Oregon, last night. An incendiary fire burned the new hotel at Spokane, Wash. Loss, \$25,000. Two broken arms, head cut, shoulder crippled, upper lip half bitten off, and head hurt from lick with neck yoke, six in all being injured in a Scotch family row at Walla Walla. THURSDAY Aug 13 The warship, Massachusetts, struck on a shoal during a fog, and will have to go dry dock. An earthquake in Argentina killed five persons and injured many others. Much damage was done otherwise. Silver City, New Mexico, was damaged \$100,000 by flood. The business portion was flooded to the extent of seven feet of water rushing through the streets. A cloudburst washed out railroad tracks in Kansas and Missouri. A negro, by name of Mitchell, who posed as Mark Hanna's agent, has swindled Southern negroes out of \$5,000. He represented himself as soliciting money to aid in the passage of Hanna's Slave Pension Bill. Twenty men were arrested for inflicting severe punishment on six other men in a factional fight at Whitney, Indiana. FRIDAY Aug 14 Four thousand Turkish troops have been landed and taken Kirmshove from the insurgents, Halim, who murdered the Russian consul, was condemned and executed. The National Building Trades Council Convention in session at Denver, endorsed W. R. Hearst, of New York, for the Presidential election of the United States next year. A white man and a negro were lynched in Georgia for associating with a white woman. Fourteen masked cattlemen whipped a shepherd to death in Montana. A madman fired into a crowd at Winfield, Kan. Six persons are dead and three more are expected to die as a result of his deed. The union bands of San Francisco refuse to parade with military bands because they are non union. A farmer living near Spokane was lincoced out of \$2,300 by two sharpers. SATURDAY Aug 15 Russia is preparing to enforce her demands upon Turkey for the severe punishment of all persons in anyway responsible for the assassination of Consul Rattokovski. Lieut. Gen. S. B. M. Young succeeds himself as chief of staff. Two brakemen were killed and an engineer injured in a freight train collision in Pa. A dense fog is given as the cause. A train went through a bridge near Natchez, Miss., injuring twelve persons. The bridge had been weakened by a flood. The navy department may abolish civilian surgeons. They have been passing men unfit for service. Peru is undergoing a scourge of the plague. Cotton mills have cut work in New England, and many operatives are out of work. MONDAY, August 16. A powerful Russian squadron has sailed for Turkey, and the Sultan is mobilizing his forces. Mo-tana is having a severe visitation of grasshoppers. MARINE. ARRESTED. Aug. 16.—Schr Advance, Jorgensen, 17 days from San Francisco, to O. M. & T. Co. Aug. 18.—Schr Coquille, Pederson, 32 days from San Pedro to Prosper Mill Co. Sailed. Aug. 14.—Schr Gen.
