EDITORIAL.

The Ship Subsidy schemers are at work again trying to interest the press, and the country generally, in marine statistics with an eye single to foisting upon the public another burden in the way of taxing the producers to build up a trade for some more infants in need of government support. Beware of the man with an ax to grind.

The most dangerous specie of bug is the firebug, and just now this kind is springing into existence in many places. This class of individuals is a menace to life and property, and should be taken care of, and while we are taking care of these bugs, the cause that produces them should be looked up and taken care of also. The cause will be found in a vitiated business fabric.

Another desirable change is wanted, desirable to the banking fraternity, but to nobody else. At the Banker's Association, to meet at Saratoga next month, an effort will be made with a view toward doing away with the express system, and the money order department by the government, and taking up the same by the banks. Capital is not satisfied; there is no place where it is content to stop. The people must not own a convenience of their own; they must get out of business; the bankers see another chance to fasten a burden on the people and will leave no stone unturned until their object is accomplished. This class is not satisfied unless it can dictate the laws of the government and eliminate all privileges from the people as a government. It is time for the average citizen to become a kicker and to kick vigorously for his rights. The present system of money order suits the convenience of the public, and it is time to say to the banking fraternity—hands off.

It is written that "man shall reap what he sows," and when we look at the crop that is being harvested now, we can but admit the truth of the principle. To condone wrong doing, which is unrighteousness, in any quarter or in any class of people, but prepares the way for a crop of evil-doing which will grow and increase until such time as conditions become unbearable, and a revolt becomes necessary to get rid of the awful consequences. In the business fabric, of this country in particular, and of the world in general, during the last four decades, privileges have been granted, and conditions obtained wherein favored classes have been enabled to rob production, and to thrive at the expense of the life blood, the honesty, and often the virtue of their victims; and these conditions are producing their harvests of thieves, robbers, incendiaries, swindlers, murderers, etc. until the world is getting ripe for destruction. The earthquakes, tornadoes, accidents and other phenomena are not the result of chance.
