EDITORIAL

Port Orford Tribune.—All we were able to learn of the much talked of coast railroad, while in Crescent City last week, was that the road, if built on the survey recently made, will tap the heart of the vast redwood forests of Northern California; continue many miles along the bank of Smith River, miss Crescent City by about eight miles, and pass within about three-quarters of a mile of Smith River Harbor, and terminate at Chetco harbor. At present a party of surveyors are engaged in surveying a route for a road from Humboldt Bay up the coast to Crescent City.
