Boats Inspected.

Inspectors Edwards and Roberts arrived at Coquille last Saturday and inspected the new steamers Liberty and Dispatch for their respective companies, passing upon each. The steamer Liberty was allowed to carry one hundred and fifty passengers and the Dispatch was rated for two hundred and forty. The Liberty went on her run between Bandon and Coquille last Sunday. The Dispatch came down Monday evening and took up the freight brought in by the steamer Chico, next day to Coquille and will be ready to take her place on the route from here to Coquille and return by next Monday. Both of these vessels are improvements upon what we have hitherto had, and the lower Coquille will not want for good service, and we hope that the trade may increase in proportion as the capacity of these boats have increased above the old ones.

Object of Western Pacific now Being Predicted.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 9.—George L. Dillman, Chief Engineer of the Western Pacific Railroad, has just returned from Salt Lake, which has been the base of operations while in the field. According to his report of progress of work on the new road, there are now 13 engineering corps engaged in lining out the proposed route of the track and construction has already commenced. It is now, it is said, a foregone conclusion that the Western Pacific is to be a feeder of the Gould system, the forerunner of a new competing transcontinental line.

Southern Pacific Plans to Build Coast Road.

GRANT'S PASS, Or., Sept. 8.—The report published some time ago in The Telegram to the effect that the Southern Pacific would be the first to give Southern Josephine and Humboldt Counties connection with the outside world, seems to have been well founded, in the light of recent developments. From the well-informed sources it is learned that the Southern Pacific intends to build its Coast road from Willits to Eureka, to Crescent City, in a connection with the same road at Grant's Pass.

A circumstance of importance in connection with this railroad talk is the fact of there having been filed articles of incorporation of the Oregon & Eureka Railroad Company with the Secretary of State, at Salem. These papers are quite lengthy, and among other things state that the name of the company shall be "Oregon & Eureka Railroad Company," and that its duration shall be perpetual. The principal offices of this company are to be in Portland.

The main line of this proposed railroad is to run from a point in or near the city of Eureka, Humboldt County, Cal., by a convenient and practical route in a general northwesterly direction to Crescent City, an approximate distance of 90 miles. Thence the connections are to be made with the main line of the Southern Pacific at Grant's Pass.

The Oregon & Pacific Railroad Company's crew of surveyors, who have surveyed a line from Grant's Pass to Crescent City, and thence southward toward Humboldt Bay, are at present at work surveying from Mills Creek over to Hunter Creek. A survey was made last month from Mills Creek to Wilson Creek. The object of this second survey over practically the same route is to find the most practical one of the two. A survey will be made down Hunter's Creek to Klamath River, and a bridge site will be decided upon.

Important News Notes

TURKEY, Sept. 8 Turkish soldiers massacred Christians at Beirut. A. J. McKinnon, formerly of Hillsboro, Oregon was shot and killed at Guerneville, Calif., by a mad man. Explorers from the University of Chicago intend to search Tel. Libanin in Palestine for the tomb of Abraham. Frank Mulkey was stabbed to death by Johnathan J. Butler, at Junction City, Ore. A large sawlog rolled over Earl Willowsby at Fuller's sawmill, near Cambridge, Idaho, with fatal effect. Twelve people were injured in a Kansas train wreck, two fatally.

WEDNESDAY, Sept. 9 News came to light that an insane patient 80 years old was killed at Salem by his room mate, Aug. 23. Strikers attacked a militiaman on guard duty at Victor, Colo. The guard was incensed when picked up but not seriously injured. J. H. Burks and John Tom McNamara broke jail at Hillsboro, Oregon. The former was in for forgery and the latter for stealing. Seth Low is reported as a candidate for mayor of New York again. The Colorado coal miners will demand eight hour day and bi-monthly payday. More Christians have been killed at Beirut.

THURSDAY, Sept. 10 Admiral Cotton is ready to land 500 blue jackets and marines at Beirut if our consul gives the signal. 600 Turkish troops were routed by Macedonians. Riots are making onslaughts on Armenians during the quietest state in Turkey. Five masked men robbed a hotel at Tacoma. The robbers got away with \$1,500. The home of an Indiana editor who opposed licensing saloons, was blown up. Three men in Newark, N. J., were arrested for coinng silver coins without the government's sanction.

FRIDAY, Sept. 11 Edward Arpin the Portland firebug and hold-up youth was bound over for trial. A destructive storm visited Great Britain, tying up shipping and stopping communication. Portland was visited by a slight earthquake, four distinct shocks being felt. The postoffice scandal is nearing San Francisco, one of the indictments is reported to have been a San Francisco man. A powder car ran wild near Beaumont, Kansas, and dashed into a train causing an explosion and killing two men. SATURDAY, Sept. 12 Bulgaria is preparing for war with Turkey. France has decided to send a war vessel to Turkey. The armored cruiser, Maryland, was launched at Newport News. Colorado is having a visitation of snow storms. Great damage caused from storms in Germany. The Babiou plague is prevalent at Marcellus, Italy. Russia is not ready to evanescence Manchuria and asks an extension of time. Eight persons were rescued from an overturned boat near Port au Prince, West Indies. Two negroes and a white man engaged in the hold-up trade at Grant's Pass have been captured.
