Narrow Escape. Jack Farley had a narrow escape from death by drowning last Saturday night, and only escaped by the timely assistance of the Cape Arago Life-Saving Station. At 8 p.m. calls for help were heard by the station lookout, coming from the cove at Rocky Point. Immediately the Life-Saving crew was off for the scene, and in a few minutes found a man in a dying condition from drowning and exposure to cold, clinging to a rock among the kelps. A fire was built on the beach and the man resuscitated by the Life-Saving crew. The man proved to be Jack Farley, of Empire, who, while on his journey home from South slough, in crossing the cove in the dark and strong ebb tide, lost an oar, swamped his boat, and attempted to swim to shore. The boat was recovered and man and boat taken to Empire City.—Const Mail.

Keoper Johnson made as close an inquiry as to the wreck and what took place after the vessel struck, as he could, and in his description to a Recorder reporter he felt sure that there was bad management after the accident occurred, as accounts from the sailors and passengers indicate that the occupants were spilled out of the Captain's boat into the ocean in launching it. Then the second boat was permitted to get away with no person in it, thus limiting the means of escape. It seems that under careful management there was no reason why all could not have been saved.
