Myrtle Point, Nov. 30.—John McCulloch was tried before Justice of the Peace, Shriber, today for disturbing the peace Saturday afternoon. He had made a rough house of the Myrtle Point hotel barroom, throwing billiard balls, chairs and poker chips and lastly a small cat around the room. He was fined \$5.00. He seemed not content with this, and went in a poker game in the evening in Macklin's saloon, and picked a quarrel with Joe Kennedy, an old man, 65 years of age. In the fracas that followed, Kennedy was badly wounded in the right temple. He received two bad gashes which seemed to indicate that a knife or some sharp instrument had been used. Dr. Stemmer attended the man, and dressed his head, after which he was able to walk about. McCulloch had not been arrested at the time of this report.—Coast Mail. Serious Accident. Last Sunday morning, as Chas. Self was driving his horses out of the barnyard on his place above town, a two-year-old colt lagged behind and Charlie stepped up and slapped it on the rump. The colt kicked and one foot struck Charlie square in the face, cutting his upper lip severely and tearing the lower end of his nose loose from his face. It was thought at first that his upper jaw was broken but an examination proved it to be not so serious as that. He was standing at just the right distance from the colt to receive the full force of the blow. He came to town in a boat and Dr. Russel dressed the wound, taking five stitches in the upper lip. He stayed in town with his brother-in-law, Will Darby, several days in order to be convenient to the doctor and we are pleased to state that he is doing nicely.—Coquille Bulletin. Articles of incorporation of the California & Oregon Coast Railroad company were filed recently in San Francisco. It has organized with a capital stock of \$1,000,000 to build a railway 191 miles long through Josephine and Curry counties in Oregon and Del Norte and Humboldt counties in California. The route lies from Grants Pass via Wilderville, Selma, Kerby and Crescent City to a connection with the proposed railway to Humboldt Co. from San Francisco. The route for the proposed road is surveyed and a good part of the right of way contracted for, so there will be nothing to hinder the company from going to work next Spring.—Exchange. He Quick. An insane man fired three shots at Kenneth Graham, secretary of the bank of England, without effect. Princess Alice eloped with a coachman at Berlin. 80 Moros and one American were killed last Friday in a battle at Jolo, P. I. WEDNESDAY, November 25 Charles Wathen, a Baptist minister of Owenboro, Ky., was sentenced to two years in the pen. for raising a one dollar bill to a ten and passing it. An agreement was reached at noon today and the Chicago strike is settled. The United States has sent two regiments of soldiers to Colon on the North side of Panama. Five employees of the Elna Powder Co., were killed by an explosion, near Crow's Point, Ind., and two more fatally hurt. Bart Ross was electrocuted on a pole in the streets of San Francisco, having come in touch with a live wire. Sixteen year old Beula Thomas, of York, Neb., was kidnapped. She was a witness in an important case. THURSDAY, November 26 The piece of railroad across Salt Lake, known as the Cutoff, was declared finished and dedicated today. The Bark Araby Maid was sunk in the Gulf of Mexico by collision with the steamer Denver, on Saturday night. Two persons were drowned. The revolutionary party were successful in San Domingo and the for-

mer president and cabinet takes a leave of absence. They went to Cuba. Four firemen were burned to death in an Omaha fire. Loss of property, \$300,000. Major J. W. McClung threw himself between Mrs. Lillie H. Coit and her assailant, at San Francisco, and received the bullet intended for her. He will probably recover. FRIDAY, November 27 President Roosevelt attended the funeral of his uncle, James King Gracie, at New York. Three bandits held up a train in Northern Indiana, shot two policemen and escaped. A separator blew up in a creamery, in New Jersey, killing one man and injuring two more, perhaps fatally. Montana legislature is assembling in special session. Spain takes steps to break off relations with Venezuela because of affront offered the Spanish consul. SATURDAY, November 28 Columbia is willing to grant all concessions contained in the annual treaty only asking that she may be permitted to put down the rebellion on the Isthmus. Lord Roberts, Commander-in-Chief of the British army, will resign because of ill health. Emperor William withdraws offer of cup for race across the Atlantic, because of ill health. He expects to make the offer for race in 1905. West Point cadets did up the Annapolis cadets in a game of football at Philadelphia.
