## EDITORIAL

Canada has always had a salubrious climate for American rogues, and it would not be surprising if the postal fraud investigation does not add to her population.

Russia and Japan hold the checker-board of interest at present. One day it is peace, and the next it is—Oh well, why don't they have their scrap out and give the public nerve a chance to quiet down and rest.

The ladies have not had an inning in eight years, but it is time to cheer up and be pleasant. Leap year is soon to be ushered in with all its kind opportunities. Bachelors will soon occupy the anxious seat.

Hawaii is rapidly becoming modernized, and is settling down to twentieth century civilization with neatness and dispatch. The latest, from that progressive protégé of Uncle Sam, is that the legislature there is charged with gross fraud. The legislative assembly probably took its cue from postoffice department raiders in this country. How apt they are to learn.

Representative Gaines, of Tennessee, has introduced a bill in Congress to extend the term of the President to six years, and to make him ineligible for a second term. It is not likely that such a measure will pass, as it has been up before Congress in the past, and it should not, as six years is too long for a bad administration, and may be too short for a good one. It is better as it is, while to legislate a man ineligible to the presidency, is to curtail his liberty, and that which curtails the privileges of the honorable, upright citizen, is un-American.

## Commendable Patience.

So far as one can observe, the Southern Pacific management has taken the car shortage problem, as it applies to Oregon, under serious consideration, and there is at least some promise of relief. The loss that has resulted to Oregon industries through this cause has already been considerable, but under the circumstances those who have had to sustain it have shown commendable patience. It is true there has been much bitter complaint, but at the same time shippers have come to realize that the railroad people are confronted with practical difficulties, which require a little time and business prudence to dispose of satisfactorily.

Traffic Manager Stubbs' statement of the case is undoubtedly a fair one. He calls attention to the fact that the present congested condition is of a periodical character, and that the power and rolling stock of the road are all-sufficient if the traffic requirements could be averaged throughout the year. He admits, however, that production in Oregon has gone forward at an abnormal rate, and there follows a promise of active measures to relieve the unsatisfactory conditions which now exist. It is to be hoped that the business interests of the state may realize the fulfillment of these promises. It is to be assumed, as a matter of business, that the Southern Pacific would be as regardful of its interests in a state that is making such rapid industrial strides as is Oregon; and the attitude of Mr. Stubbs and other officials of the road would indicate that if calm counsel prevails present traffic troubles may be overcome with the least difficulty.—Telegram.

## In Need of Correction.

There is an unexplainable looseness somewhere in the administrative department of the National Government, when a man convicted of corruption and conspiracy, in which he used the robe of official authority for the perpetration of robbery, is appointed to prosecute others of his ilk. An act such as the appointment of C. S. A. Frost to be assistant prosecutor in the land fraud cases compares in small degree with the announced sentiments of the Chief Executive of the Nation on the subject of public corruption and the means for its correction. The appointment of Frost is undoubtedly a departmental matter, which is not under the direct attention of the President; nevertheless there is no denying the fact that the absence of warrant for such a step in view of its antagonism to a correct public policy, as admitted in principle by the President, cannot but reflect on the general Administration. The language of President Roosevelt with reference to the postoffice scandal is clear and unmistakable in its denunciation of official reascalty. With such sentiments honestly entertained, as they are beyond question, the appointment of a man like Frost to a position of trust or to any position under the Federal Government, simply indicates that there is a screw loose in the administrative machinery and that for the honor of the executive branch of the Government and the American people generally, the maladjustment, wherever it exists, should be corrected.—Telegram.
