Whether the drowning was accidental or intentional, is not known. He suddenly disappeared from home and his whereabouts was unknown until his body was found floating in the bay.

The Railroad Survey.
The railroad surveyors who have been working on a line from Drain down the Umpqua valley to Gardiner and Winchester Bay, have passed Ten Mile Creek, and will move to McFarlin's place on North Slough in a few days. They are camped at present on J. H. Hibbard's place on Ten Mile, living and cooking in tents, although clerical work and drawing of plans, maps, etc., is done in Mr. Hibbard's residence. The party averages about 25 men, headed by Mr. Cooper, chief engineer and manager, with Mr. Drum, clerk and paymaster. The work done appears very complete and accurate, though no one claims to know for whom they are working, except for a "rich company." The line will cross Coos Bay below North Bend, and the surveyors expect to continue south until they meet another party working their way northward, probably in the neighborhood of Bandon.—Coast Mail.

St. Louis Exhibit.
The committee appointed by the gathering at Marshfield for the purpose of perfecting an organization and preparing an exhibit for the St. Louis Exposition, met in this city in the Bulletin office, Wednesday, at 10 a. m. The meeting was not largely attended, but those present were enthusiastic, which made up for a certain extent, for lack of numbers.

President Dow called the meeting to order, and after discussion it was resolved that this committee be an executive committee of the whole, that three members shall constitute a quorum, that proxies be allowed to attend and vote at any meeting, and that regular meetings be held weekly at Marshfield, on Monday nights at 7:30 and monthly, at Coquille, on the first Thursday in each month, at 10 a. m.

The following were appointed members of the committee: W. L. Hood, Alfred Johnson, J. L. Hicking, J. Carman, P. L. Phelan, R. H. Ross, E. J. Price, W. T. Merchant, and J. J. Lamb.

It was decided to circulate a petition asking the county court to appropriate \$1000 for providing suitable display at St. Louis.

L. J. Simpson, W. T. Merchant and Alfred Johnson appointed a special committee to arrange lumber display with request to provide special pavilion for Coos County.

S. B. Herman, P. Hennessey and W. S. Chandler appointed special committee on mineral display.

Flanagan & Bennett Bank elected treasurer.

Two thousand buttons with words "Coos County Push Club" thereon, ordered, and to be placed on sale at 50 cents each, to help raise funds.

No expense to be incurred except by duly authorized requisition, signed by the secretary, and no money paid out except by warrant on treasurer, and duly ordered at a meeting of the committee.

An Outlet for Oregon Timber.
Ogden, Utah, Dec. 9.—H. H. Spencer, one of the directors of the Ogden & Northwestern Railroad, a line 20 miles long, which runs northwest from Ogden, stated today that arrangements have been completed for the extension of the road, and that if negotiations now pending are successful, that the road will be pushed to 11 miles of track, and more rolling stock.

Ogden, Utah, Dec. 9.—The Ogden & Northwestern, which is to be extended to Coos Bay, is owned principally by David H. H. Spencer and Thomas D. Dow. They are wealthy capitalists and own the controlling interest in the Amalgamated Sugar Company of Utah, with factories at Ogden and Logan, and are also the head of the Utah & Oregon Lumber Company, with headquarters at Baker City, and they own the Sumpter Valley Road.

Nine miles of the Ogden & Northwestern has already been built northwest from Ogden, and is in operation. Steel has also been ordered for 11 miles more, which takes it to Brigham City, the center of the Bear River Valley of Utah. For the first 150 miles the road will tap a rich agricultural district, the principal product of which is sugar beets. The road is designed to form an outlet for the timber districts of Oregon, both east and west.

The men who are behind it have millions available themselves, and, being connected with the sugar magnates of the East, are in a position to command unlimited capital. It is thought that there are negotiations now on foot between these men and the projectors of the proposed Coos Bay Road, but the Ogden parties decline to be interviewed.

At first it was thought this road would eventually become a part of the Western Pacific, coming from San Francisco through the Beckwith Pass, as Mr. Eccles and his associates own large tracts of timber land in California traversed by that road, and he made a trip to San Francisco some months ago, and met the promoters of that line, but now it is practically admitted that the Coos Bay outlet is desired. At this point the road forms a junction with the Rio Grande Western, San Pedro, and Oregon Short Line, Union and Southern Pacific.

Important News Notes
TUESDAY, December 8
The United States Consul Davis was attacked by the police at Alexandria, Turkey. He pulled down the American flag and left Beirut.

The Secretary of the Interior has ruled that all must reside upon homesteads in order to prove up.

Paul Tomcheck made a break for liberty, at Portland, just after sentence was pronounced, but was recaptured, and will make Salem his home for the next three years.

A Texas negro, found guilty of an attempt to assault, was sentenced to a term of 1000 years in the pen.

A genuine book worm has been discovered by Prof. Herbert C. Howe, in his library at Eugene.

The Russian troops have defeated a band of Chinese robbers, at Liao River, Manchuria, killing 300 of them.

WEDNESDAY, December 9
The Colombian army is marching toward Panama, so says report.

Turkey declares Consul Davis was to blame at Alexandria, that he used force, Chili is planning to annex two disputed provinces which are claimed by Peru.

The Italian ship, Cavour, went ashore on Peacock spit near Astoria, last night, and is

ground to pieces. The crew were saved.

The Fraser Mountain Copper Company of New Mexico, is in the hands of a receiver. New Jersey people investigated \$200,000. Now there is \$7 in the treasury, and the promoter is missing.

Bassia is threatening or bluffing in order to prevent the opening of Port Yongampho, China, to the world's commerce. She sends 3000 men and eight warships to the scene.

The Illinois manufacturers declare for right to hire whom they please.

THURSDAY, December 10
General McArthur is reported as declaring that war is inevitable between this country and Germany in the near future over South American interests.

Senator Clark, of Montana, had a surgical operation performed on his ear today, and is pronounced much better.

Head Smoot will most likely have to stand a contest to maintain his seat in the Senate. Non-union carmen were roughly handled at Chicago.

Chili will annex provinces of Teco and Arica, and introduce reforms.

Washington State will pay the \$2,500,000 offered as a reward for the capture of Tracy.

A big timber steal is revealed in Idaho. It is stated that millions of feet, in logs, have been removed from that state.

FRIDAY, December 11
Two trains collided at Oakland, California. There were several narrow escapes, but no serious injuries.

The Santa Fe railroad shops at La Junta, Colorado, were burned. Loss \$50,000.

Ernest Cassell, a condemned murderer, escaped from his cell at Ottawa, Canada. He forced his guards into his cell, and locked them in.

Seven persons were seriously burned at a fire in Pittsburg, which destroyed the cork factory there.

Major-General Leonard Wood has proclaimed the anti-alcohol law passed last October, in Moro Land.

The hemp trade of the Philippines is reported to be growing.

The U. S. Gunboat Castine, bound for Colon, grounded in the Delaware river.

SATURDAY, December 12
The Republican National Committee assembled at Washington and chose Chicago as the place, and June 21st, 1904, the date for the Republican National Convention.

W. L. Buchanan, of Buffalo, is named as U. S. Minister to Panama.

Two torpedo boats have been ordered to proceed from Mare Island, San Francisco, to Panama.

A wedding party was thrown over a bluff in Montana, by the upsetting of their conveyance. The woman was insensible for over 48 hours, and the groom, M. C. Connors, probably fatally hurt.

Walls Walla wheat growers disposed of large quantities at 65 cents. Upwards of 20,000 bushels were sold.

A fire at Forest Grove destroyed a warehouse containing over 500 tons of hay.

The M. M. Maltby and his followers have taken to cannibalism in order to husband supplies, so says news reports.

MONDAY, December 14
Five persons were killed in a railway accident in Iowa, and several others injured. A store was burglarized near Salem, and goods to the value of \$100 were stolen.
