ORDINANCE NO. 58.

An Ordinance to Prohibit the Depositing of Rubbish on any of the Streets and Sidewalks of the Town.

The Town of Bandon does ordain as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to deposit, discharge, put, throw or leave upon any of the streets, sidewalks, alleys or backyards of that part of the Town of Bandon, included within the fire limits as described in Sec. 1 of Ordinance No. 18, "Entitled an Ordinance for the Prevention of Fires," any boxes, rubbish, packing paper, cast off clothing, stagnant or impure water, or debris, under a penalty of not less than five (5) or more than twenty-five (25) dollars and costs, or not less than five (5) nor more than ten (10) days in the Town jail, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2. Any straw, rubbish or boxes scattered or deposited on the sidewalks or streets in opening or removing goods or merchandise, shall be removed, and the streets and walks put in cleanly order with all reasonable dispatch after opening and removing such goods or merchandise, and in no case shall the street or walk be allowed to be wholly obstructed thereby.

In case such straw or other material shall not speedily be removed, it shall be the duty of the marshal, at the expense of the person or persons receiving such goods or merchandise including five (5) dollars for marshal fees, to cause the same to be removed, and the streets and walks cleaned.

Expenses and charges may be recovered in an action before the Town Recorder.

Sec. 3. No person or persons shall deposit or leave in any of the streets or on any of the sidewalks within the limits of the Corporation, any trucks, wagons, wheelbarrows or chairs, or any barn-yard manure, ashes, or rubbish whatsoever, under penalty of not less than five (5) dollars or more than twenty-five (25) dollars and costs, for each and every offense.

The cost of prosecution shall include five (5) dollars fees for the Marshal in presenting the complaint which sum is hereby allowed him in case of conviction.

Provided, further, that time be given such person or persons who have piles of firewood or building material in front of their premises, to remove the same.

Sec. 4. Upon conviction of any of the charges herein, the defendants shall be ordered to pay all costs of the prosecution, and in default of the payment of the fine and cost shall be imprisoned at the rate of one day for two dollars of the fine and cost, but in no case for more than twenty-five (25) days.

Sec. 5. All forfeitures and penalties herein imposed, shall be presented and prosecuted in the same manner as provided in other like cases.
