Important News Notes

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 5.
Wisconsin and North Dakota experienced the worst blizzard in many years.

Baseball men are talking of a trust, the object being to overcome rancorous competition to obtain players.

Two Houston, Texas, firms are placed in the hands of receivers.

Stock in Southern California is starting on account of shortness of feed caused by drought.

There were 125 insane persons admitted to the asylum from Multnomah County during 1903.

Attey of San Francisco knocked out Harry Forbes, at St. Louis, and claims the world's light weight championship.

WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 3.
Russian squadron at Port Arthur joins squadron in the Yellow Sea.

Japanese occupy Seoul-Fusan railroad, and take guns to Seoul.

Several passengers were killed and many others injured in a railroad wreck near Halifax, N. S.

During the week Russia ordered 70,000 tons of coal delivered at Port Arthur.

The flurry in the cotton market is over, and the price is tending downward.

William C. Whitney, ex Secretary of the Navy, died at New York, yesterday.

A lone robber held up a hotel saloon at Baker City. He got away with about \$75.

THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 4.
Japan gives up all hope of pacific settlement, and Japanese are notified to leave Vladivostok.

Russian troops are steadily moving in direction of Yala River.

Yaqui Indians held up a stage in Colorado, and murdered its six occupants.

Reno, Nevada, was struck by a terrific cyclone, and much damage done. No lives were reported lost.

Senator Hanna is seriously ill, and will be confined to his house for some weeks.

Bolton, De Ruyter & Co., of San Francisco, have failed.

FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 5.
Japan is reported to have smuggled 50,000 well drilled soldiers into Corea in the guise of laborers.

A town in Java has been destroyed by earthquake, and hundreds of people killed.

Three persons were burned to death in a small fire at Montreal.

Six unknown foreigners perish in a fire at Trenton, N. J. Several buildings were destroyed.

The price of cotton still goes down. Mark Hanna has typhoid fever.

SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 6.
From San Francisco comes the news that the Japanese Government has issued a call for the return of its subjects liable to military duties.

From East India come news of earthquake shocks at Drazzo and Assadi Vassarahy. The people are panic stricken.

Senator Reed Smoot's case will come up for trial on the 1st of March. Clark Doughton was shot and killed at Tygh Valley, Oregon. The party doing the shooting had shot at Doughton's dog mistaking it for a wild animal, but missed the dog, and shot the man who was near by.

Local option and direct primary laws will be submitted at the June election.

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 8.
The City of Baltimore was visited by a destructive fire, the greatest known in this country. It burned for 27 hours before it was got under control. The loss is estimated at over \$200,000,000.

Senator Hanna rests more easily, but temperature is higher.
