EDITORIAL

The Russian Bear has been unable to hole up for the winter, and he is now in a fair way to show up again and jaded by the time spring opens up. There are heaps of trouble brewing for poor old brain, and no time for a winter's napping.

Has poison fled from the earth? It begins to look that way, or at least, it seems so weak, that a breath of the blight of war, will sweep it and launch the whole world into a scene of awful strife, carnage and bloodshed. All nations are preparing for the fray, and the war spirit is so rife, that it will not take much of a pretext to launch the whole political structure into the tumultuous condition toward which the tendency is so strongly inclined.

Russia has come out and declared her purpose regarding Korea, so that there is no longer doubt as to her designs. The Eastern war now assumes the status of a prize fight, and the two belligerents are contending for the bone of contention. However, Japan has more at stake than the prize under dispute, as it is generally understood that Russia is reaching out to acquire territory and subjects, and if not checked in her scheme, she would doubtless, in time, annex China, and then take Japan likewise, so that it is a matter of future safety that seems to fire the patriotism of the Mikado's subjects.

Contraction of Bad Habits.

It is because of this attribute that idleness is dangerous ground to stand upon, as the mind, unoccupied, too often becomes the devil's workshop in devising questionable means to pass away time.

The New Tax Law.

Sheriff Gallier has sent out statements of taxes due by property owners, and below we give a summary of the tax law as published in the Coast Mail:

If you pay your taxes on or before March 15th, you will be allowed a rebate of 3 per cent.

If you pay your taxes between March 15th and up to and including the first Monday in April, there will not be any rebate, and neither will there be any penalty or interest added.

If your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday in April, they will become delinquent, when there will be added a penalty of 10 per cent, and the tax will also draw interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum in addition to the penalty.

If you pay one-half of your taxes on or before the first Monday in April, the remaining half may run up to and including the first Monday in October following; but if the last half of tax due is not paid by the first Monday in October, it may become delinquent, and there will be added to such balance a penalty of 10 per cent; and in addition such will bear interest at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from the first Monday in April until paid.

On all personal property taxes, if one-half is not paid on or before the first Monday in April, the law compels the sheriff to levy upon and collect the same after May 1st; hence, to prevent a levy upon personal property after May 1st, it will be necessary for one-half to be paid as above stated.

The law compels the sheriff to sell all lands on which taxes have not been paid, and that such sale shall not be held later than March 1st of the year succeeding the year in which the tax levy is made.

The property will be sold to the person bidding the lowest rate of interest, and certificates will be issued therefor, and deeds given to such property sold, unless redeemed within three years from the date of such sale.

Prohibition From The Socialist Stand Point.

Ed. Journal: Consistency thou art a Prohibitionist. In his Journal article of the 1th inst., Mr. Jory logically concludes that the man who votes for saloon licenses is an aider and abettor of the saloon keeper, and is, therefore, no better than the saloon keeper. But how much better is the man who votes against license, yet votes for and sustains the very foundation upon which the saloon is built, and without which it would not exist for a single day. I say how much better is the Prohibitionist who votes against license, but believes in, and votes to support a system which is the foundation cause of the saloon? Every one knows and will admit the saloon keeper is keeping saloon for the profits there is in it. Eliminate profits from the saloon business, and the saloon will disappear at once. Men do not keep saloon because they love the calling. Many saloon keepers detest the business, and would cheerfully discard it could they find other occupation that would pay as well for time and effort expended; they keep saloon because it makes large returns in profits for efforts expended. The Prohibition Party stands for a system that makes the saloon possible, and keeps it in existence. The saloon will remain so long as there is immense gains to be made from the sale of liquor. Prohibitionary laws in some of the states has limited the sale of liquor to some extent, but in no case has it entirely prohibited it. Prohibition Kansas sells two gallons per capita, (this statement I get from the "California Voice," an out and out prohibition paper). The Prohibitionists have never declared against the system of greed and gain, a system which is not only responsible for the saloon crime, but which is responsible for 90 per cent of all crimes. Prohibitionists antagonize and misrepresent those who would bear the foundation from the saloon business, and make it impossible. Prohibitionists are harping up the wrong tree. They are treating a symptom, the saloon is an effect, the profit and gain system is the cause. The prohibitionist is trying to purify the stream without removing the cause which exists at its source. Why not, Brother Profit, treat the cause of the disease instead of its symptoms, why not remove the pollution which exists at the source of the stream? Your position is just as untenable, just as inconsistent, as the man who prays for the abolition of the saloon, and votes to sustain it. You are an aider and abettor of the saloon keeper. "People who live in glass houses should not throw stones." What just right have you to point the finger of scorn at the Republican or Democrat who votes for licenses when you yourself are equally guilty? "Oh, consistency, thou art a jewel." I know that you will protest very hard against being placed in the same class with those who vote for the licensed saloon, but you voluntarily occupy the position which places you in that class, and you have only yourself to blame. I invite you to come out and join a party which openly and explicitly declares against the system of greed and gain, the Socialist party.
