EDITORIAL

The watchmakers of Elgin, Illinois, are about to go on a strike. We wonder how it will affect time. Will it decrease, increase, or raise the price only?

Labor Unions, of New York, are certainly up against a real antagonist now. They have agreed to drink only Union whisky, and two hard propositions confront them. The first is this: When a man gets about as thirsty drunk he is not in a condition to cure very much as to who made the whisky, and in the second instance, a man who is suffering from forced abstinence, and finds the thirst taxing his powers of resistance so severely that he cannot, or will not, withstand the temptation to satisfy his thirst, he is not so particular as to the brand. The satisfaction of his thirst and stimulation of his physical being is urging him on, and this can be satisfied by non-union whisky just as easily as by any other brand, and he won't trouble himself to look for the trade-mark and wait another opportunity when the thirst is urging him on. Non-union whisky will make him just as drunk as union whisky.

Valuable Hales Gathered From Various Teachers of Epileptic States.

If you often in a semi-drowsy condition and feel unaccountably, you should endeavor to secure more nourishment. Eat plenty of butter, cream, eggs and bacon. Take a little cod-liver oil at meal time, and between meals take a drink of hot milk or beef tea.

A normal count is a consumption of 1000 calories. Half the life of fish are caused by overeating. If you are feeling run down you will do well to fast for several days, and then confine yourself to two light meals each day. This will give your system time to rid itself of its poison. Half a loaf, well digested, is better than an overladen stomach.

You should only have exercise taken every day. Increase the distance until you can walk ten or even twenty miles per day. You will be surprised at the results.

Try the rest cure. Most people are too restless. Go to bed and stay there a week. Read light literature during the day, and give your mind and body complete rest. Eat nothing your vitality.

Hot water is an excellent medicine. Drink a pint of it in the morning and before each meal. It cleans out the stomach and bowels, and purifies the whole system.

The white bread is the cause of most of our ills. The hardening parts of the wheat have been removed and fed to the pigs. One needs the coarse, green bread. It contains all essential elements of the wheat, preserves the health and prevents disease.

This brown bread business is a fact. Good white flour contains very nearly as much nourishment as whole wheat flour and is more easily digested. The coarse particles in the brown bread irritate the stomach and bowels, and put an unnecessary amount of work on the digestive powers.

Prepared foods are a boon to humanity. The digestive work has largely been done by machinery, so man is spared that trouble.

Put plenty of well-seasoned home food, and avoid prepared foods as you would poison.

Woman Decorates Uncle Sam's Building. To Miss Grace Lincoln Temple has been intrusted the interior decorations of the Government structure at the World's Fair.

St. Louis.—Miss Grace Lincoln Temple, of Washington, D. C. is in charge of the Interior Decorations of the United States Government Building at the World's Fair. The work, under plans drawn by Miss Temple, has made considerable progress.

The plan of the interior decoration," said Miss Temple, "uses the architectural members of the building as opportunities for decoration. The color is applied directly to the building, oil paint to the iron, stain to the wood. This is the legitimate architectural interior decoration."

The great staircases, which arch the interior space of the building, to one great span of 175 feet, are painted a rich red. The wooden roof, which rests on the stanchions, is stained a dull deep blue. The windows of the clear story are stippled in white. The walls are surface, with green barley, and on the rough joints of the wall a wide fringe of green and gold is being painted.

The entrance is in gold with real lines of the standard government pattern, running in a streak from the center. At the center is a United States shield surrounded by a spread eagle. Miss Grace Temple lauded her profession at the Art Museum in Boston. She had charge for some years of the course of design of the School of Art in Cleveland, Ohio. She has decorated the interior of the National Museum, and of the Cosmos Club in Washington. A large number of houses in Washington and elsewhere, including the home of General Charles Lee at Falmouth, Md., have been decorated under her direction.

Homeless Widens With Play on Beach Will Last of March. The steamer Hibernia is likely to remain on the beach at Port Oxford for several weeks yet, Captain Stege, who went down with the tug Columbia to try to get her off, and that it would be useless to make the attempt under existing conditions. The Hibernia will sit on the beach and apparently head on, and a bar had been outside her on which there was only about nine feet of water. The number was also unfavorable.

L. W. Shattuck of the U. S. D. C. S. S. Co., informs the Mail that the steamer will probably be allowed to rest until the last of this month, when the highest tide will occur, about 14 feet, and unless the weather is too bad, she will probably be taken off at that time. — Coast Mail.
