EDITORIAL

The cause of the disaster to the Russian flagship, in which Admiral Markoff lost his life, seems to be quite a bone of contention between the Russians and the Japs. The latter want to claim the merit of blowing up the vessel, while the Russians, it appears, would much rather have the cause attributed to their own carelessness or anything else than to Japanese shrewdness. However, the belief is gaining that perhaps the Japs did it by operating submarine boats. This may be the true cause as it is not at all likely that the wily Brown men are desirous to enlighten Russia as to how they are conducting their operations against her fleet, providing they can keep them secret.

Will Pay Bonds

One of the things that this school district has to rejoice over is its release from bonded indebtedness. Ten years ago a loan of \$3,000, to build a school building, was secured, and in order to pay off this debt, during the past two years a special tax has been levied, which has made taxes in this district very high; but now the money has been raised and is in the hands of the County Treasurer, and on the first day of May the bonds are to be paid.

Socialist Convention

The Socialist County Convention was held at the Court House in Coquille City last Saturday, and the following nominations made:
For Joint Senator, W. H. Ray, by acclamation.
For Representative, M. Brown, of Bandon, received the nomination, also by acclamation.
On motion made, seconded and carried, it was decided to make no nomination for Sheriff.
C. B. Leep, of Coquille, then received the nomination for County Clerk by acclamation.
A motion was then made, seconded and carried, that no nomination be made for the office of Treasurer.
For Assessor, C. H. James then received the nomination by acclamation.
By motion it was decided to make no nomination for School Superintendent.
B. F. Smith was then nominated for County Commissioner for four years term, and E. J. Coffelt for short term by acclamation.
On motion made, seconded and carried, it was decided to adopt the Socialist platform of the National party adopted at Indianapolis in 1891, and pledge our support thereto.
J. D. Myers, was elected chairman of the County Central Committee for ensuing year, said committee to be composed of a member from, and elected by, each local in the County.

Says Submarines Were Used

American Naval Officer Declares Mine Theory Utterly.
New York, April 15.—Expressions from St. Petersburg of a belief that the Japanese are using submarine boats in their Port Arthur attacks, are given color by a statement credited to a retired naval officer in this city. He declares it to be the only way in which one can account for the succession of disasters met by the Russian ships.
"It is incredible," he said, "that ships which undoubtedly have charts of the mines aboard, should be blown up by them. One of the first things Vice Admiral Makaroff did when he reached Port Arthur was to survey the harbor and locate the mines.
"What is the sense of these constant bombardments if they are not feints made in order to entice the Russian ships out? The theories that the Petrovlovsk struck her own mines, or that the Japanese planted a mine during a night are untenable, and we know that the Japanese have submarines."
"A United States naval officer landed at the wrong dock, apparently an unused wharf, in a Japanese town, before the war, and saw a submarine surrounded on three sides by high fences so that it was visible only from the water side. Before he had an opportunity to examine it, Japanese soldiers on guard drove him away with force threats. They seemed highly indignant that he should have caught sight of the boat at all."

Ten Trains Stalled

Hornbrook, Cal., April 15.—Immense avalanches are being caused here by the bursting of a mountain lake, and the Southern Pacific tracks are covered by tons of mud and rocks for a considerable distance. The slide is considered the worst in recent history and will probably delay traffic 48 hours at the least.
Ten trains are stalled as a result of the slide and fully 900 passengers are on the ground.

Japan Orders Bridges in America

Philadelphia, April 15.—Active preparations are in progress for the resumption of work at the Ponced Iron works in this city. The extensive plant is controlled by the United States Steel Corporation, and has been practically idle for several weeks. Among the contracts said to have been obtained is one of 15 bridges for the Imperial Railway of Japan.
