Important News Notes

Tuesday, June 12.

The thirteenth National Republican Convention assembled at Chicago today.

Fifty thousand persons employed in the clothing trades in New York, have been called out on strike.

Members of the Dutch Henry gang of horse thieves run off a lot of horses from ranches in Montana. Three of the thieves have been captured.

The government will spend a million dollars building a cooling station at California city.

The cold and fog on Sugar creek, Josephine county, has started a rush for the new El Dorado.

A carload of prohibitionists left Portland for Indianapolis to attend the Prohibition Convention.

The Oregon pioneers gathered at Portland today.

Fire destroyed the best part of the business district of Jackson City, Miss. Loss \$50,000.

Wednesday, June 23.

An aged widow of Clatsop was robbed of \$1,700, the savings of many years' toil.

Frank Baker, a 15-year old boy, drowned while bathing in the Yellowstone river in Montana.

Negotiations are still under way for the release of Perduris and Varley from the Moorish hold.

The steamer Monterey met with severe weather and a large vessel dashed over her, off Cape Mendocino, on her way to San Francisco. She was heavily laden with coal.

Leading experts are claiming that July 4 is expected to be a dull month in Oregon. Idle men will seek work in the harvest fields.

The Japanese are to move with more expedition upon Port Arthur.

Paterson, New Jersey, had a \$500,000 fire. Secretary of State, Hayes, has through Consul General, at Tangier, asked for Perduris to be pardoned above, or for the dead body of the fanatic.

Thursday, June 23.

Theodore H. Russell and Charles K. Fairbanks were nominated by the Chicago Convention as the Republican nominees for President and Vice-President, respectively.

The French and German ministers at Port-au-Prince, Hayti, were stoned by riotous crowds opposing the police guard.

An unknown man was killed at Sheridan, California, in the act of robbing the Sheridan Cash Store.

The Marquis Drum has been appointed to chief command of the Japanese armies in the East.

The Albany, Oregon, depot was damaged by fire the building having been set on fire by sparks from a passing train.

Two Indian children, seven and four years old, stoned their little three-year-old brother to death in Utah. The oldest of the children is a girl.

President Roosevelt is to be notified of his nomination July 27th, and Fairbanks gets notice a week later.

Friday, June 25.

Attorney General Knox and Secretary Cortelyou will retire from the cabinet June 29th, and V. H. Mosley, of Mass., will be Attorney General and Victor H. Mettall, of California will be Secretary of Commerce and Labor.

France will send a warship to the Haytian government to demand reparation for the stoning of her minister. The Haytian government has refused.

A New York vessel was the race at Kiel today. Engineer Williams Yacht was third.

The Hoo Hoo building at the St. Louis exposition was destroyed by fire. The loss was \$250,000.

Butte, Montana, was visited by a snow storm today.

Montana miners have raised a large sum of money to determine in the higher courts whether the tenets of Gen. Bell and the militia in deporting miners with out trial, etc. will be sustained.

Saturday, June 25.

A Russian square in 1700 vessels made a sortie from Port Arthur, with the result that one of their best battleships was sunk, another vessel totally disabled, and a third damaged. The Japanese damage was very light.

Three masked men held up the stage between Wintney and Canyon City yesterday. Before getting much plunder they were frightened away by an approaching train.

The Japanese lost 1500 men by the attack of the Vladivostok squadron on their transports.

Perduris and Varley are returned by the Marquis bandit.

Petrogram has been found in Lane County. The find was made in a well.

A French police officer, working on a case of burglary, ran down and arrested his own son.

Monday, June 27.

The General Sherman's death list is fixed at 1403, women, children and men.

J. W. Joyce was found in an unconscious condition yesterday at Oregon City with his skull fractured. The murderer is unknown.

The Republican majority in Oregon was about 25,000.

Local Option carried the State by a majority of 2115, the total number of votes cast for it being 15,335.

32 men who were cleaning a large pipe leading from a mill into the river at Kinross, James, were drowned by the accidental flooding of the pipe.
