## Woolen Mills Building.

Work on the Woolen Mills is going ahead now as rapidly as it can be driven. The pile driver has been in operation since the middle of last week, and a space one tent width has been driven, connecting with Ross' wharf and extending east to the east side of the Woolen Mill lot.

This space will form part of the wharf in front of the building. Today work was begun on the foundation proper and arrangements are completed to expedite the construction as soon as possible.

We received a note this week from M. R. Lee, who is at Rochester, Minn., and we learn that he and an expert from San Francisco are at work there getting the machinery for the new mill ready for shipment, which task will probably be finished in from four to six weeks.

The Company intends making a good job of the foundation and will put in a concrete bed for the boilers and engines to sit upon.

## A Terrible Accident

On Friday afternoon while working in the camp of J. R. McEve at the old Stewart place Scott Maple, a comparative stranger in this section, received injuries which must necessarily prove fatal. He was working in the woods, and at the time of the accident was standing about 35 feet from a log which was being pulled by a donkey, and from which the heads pulled out, and the spring of the line threw the logs with such force that two saplings which stood between them were cut off, after which they struck Mr. Maple. It is the doctor's opinion that one of the logs caught him in the eye, tearing out a section of the skull about 1/4 inch, exposing the brain. His tongue was cut half in two and all his front teeth were knocked out, and many ugly scalp wounds were made.

The unfortunate man is 38 years of age, and all we can learn of him is from a letter sent to him from Okemah, Oklahoma, from a baby who addressed him as brother, and signed herself, Flora Lee.—*Coquille Herald*.
