The Dixie in Trouble.

C. Timmons and son went to Coos Bay the latter part of last week to bring over the gasoline launch "Dixie," which Mr. Timmons had purchased on the bay and which he desired to use in towing fish scows to the cannery.

They started on their return Saturday and all went well until they were crossing in over the bar when a breaker got control of the launch and carried it on to the jetties, where it was dashed upon the jagged rocks, with the result that the stem was split, the keel demolished, two or three holes smashed in the hull, the sternpost broken, and the rudder and propeller both damaged.

Capt. J. Johnson was outside with the tug and had offered to tow the launch in, but Mr. Timmons had thought it unnecessary. The life-saving crew were on the scene in a very short time, and made a line fast to the Dixie and the tug towed her up to the wharf.

The Dixie is a very pretty little boat and we understand that Mr. Timmons paid a thousand dollars for her. It will probably cost a couple of hundred dollars to repair her.

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Important News Notes

Tuesday, Sept. 5.

The rear guard of General Kurapatin's army gives battle while the main army falls back on Harbin. Heavy rains make the roads in bad condition.

Sick laborer laid down in a street in Seattle last night, and being reported to an officer, was ordered to throw up his hands. The man ran and the officer shot, wounding him probably fatally.

Woodside, a scholar from Long Island, New York, had a \$30,000 fire.

A large steamship, carrying flour, got into Port Arthur, reducing the price from \$3 to \$2 a sack.

Thirty families were rendered homeless by a fire at San Francisco.

George Lauth, a gambler, shot and severely wounded Mrs. Lenora Jones, at Oregon City. The woman will probably die.

Wednesday, Sept. 7.

General Kurapatin reached Mukden, but the Japanese have his rear guard.

General Kurapatin has the praise of the Russians for being able to extricate his troops from the danger that menaced them at Liao Yang.

The Republicans of Vermont have elected Charles J. Bell governor by a large majority.

The sheriff of Multnomah County is making a clean sweep in the suppression of gambling. All kinds of gambling and gambling devices must go.

Mrs. Lenora Jones died of her wounds, received yesterday at Oregon City.

While an English gunboat was engaged in firing practice, a breech lock blew out and killed three seamen and injured three others, at Portsmouth, England.

Four men were held up at Newport, Idaho, by thugs.

Great Britain and France want General Ma restrained from entering Manchuria with his 50,000 troops, on account of entangling relations likely to follow.

Thursday, Sept. 8.

Kurapatin's entire army has reached Mukden, having been on the retreat for about 15 days.

The Japs have repaired the dry dock at Port Dalney and have a cruiser in for repairs. The cruiser is one that was sunk and formerly belonged to the Russians.

General Kurapatin reports that he did not lose a gun in his retreat from Liao Yang. Chinese report that there was heavy fighting at Port Arthur, Sept. 3, in which the Japanese had to retire having sustained severe loss.

Ten persons were killed and nineteen others injured in a train wreck in Illinois.

The statue of Liberty erected on Bedloe's Island is to be repaired.

An aeronaut's parachute caught in a tree top while descending near Chicago, with the result that he fell one hundred feet and broke his neck.

Friday, Sept. 9.

A correspondent who followed the Russians at Liao Yang, places the losses at 50,000 killed in the battles that occurred around that place.

Seven persons were killed and many others injured in a train wreck in South Carolina. Safe crackers got a thousand dollar haul at the Hillboro post-office in Oregon. They left no clue.

President Dannelly called off the big sticks of the butchers and allied trades last night.

Some twenty Portland ministers are about to have trouble for not making returns of marriages solemnized by them within the 30 days allowed by law. The fine for non-compliance is \$50.

A gun sleeping in a straw stack near Spokane was mistaken for a coyote and shot by a boy. The shot mutilated one hand so that it had to be amputated.

Saturday, Sept. 10.

The hardships endured by the Russians and Japanese in the fighting around Liao Yang is thought will be followed by much sickness and loss of life.

Kurapatin reports no fighting. Muddy roads retard the Japanese forces.
