Last week we mentioned that the Empire City cannery had quit taking fish from the Coquille, which was correct, but the fishermen who had been fishing for that cannery could not dispose of their fish, the cannery commenced buying again, and is selling them down.

Arthur Carlson, the 11 year old son of Mrs. Carlson, of Liberty, lost his life yesterday, by the accidental discharge of a shot gun.

As the particulars are given to the Mail, the young man had been out hunting on South inlet with August, son of Hermann Beck. Returning, they had tied up their boat, an anchor holding her away from the bank. Young Carlson then reached out and to a load of the muzzle of the gun to take it out of the boat. Drawing it forward, the gun was discharged, the lead passing through the right side of his body just under the arm. He turned and ran about 15 steps calling out that he had shot his arm off, then fell and expired at once.

The accident happened about 4 o'clock, and the body of the unfortunate young man was brought over the hills to Liberty last evening. The funeral will be held tomorrow, and inquest will take place in L. O. O. F. meeting, on next Oct. 31.

Russians Whip a Fishing Fleet.

The Battle Fleet Sink a Lot of English Fishing Boats.

The following dispatches are copied from Monday's Coast Mail:

Hull, England, Oct. 24.—Shortly after midnight Friday the Russian battle squadron came on the Hull fishing fleet, 200 miles from here in the North Sea, and without warning fired on the boats, sinking trawler (name) killing her skipper and mate, and seriously wounding several of her crew.

The firing continued half an hour, after which the Russians hurriedly steamed away without making any effort to discover the extent of the damage they had inflicted.

News of the affair was brought to Hull by trawler Malmalmond Mino, which was seriously damaged by shots, but none aboard were injured. The fate of several of the vessels was unknown to Malmalmond and Mino when they left the scene. The injured were brought to this city.

The news created intense indignation throughout England. It is generally felt that unless a satisfactory explanation is immediately forthcoming the attack must be regarded as an act of war.

Hull, England, Oct. 24.—Only one vessel arrived this morning from the scene of attack by the battle fleet on the fishing vessels.

Latest reports state that the Russians fired three hundred shots at the fishing fleet at a range of a quarter of a mile.

The Mayor of Hull has telegraphed Premier Balfour requesting the government to "Take the speediest, strongest measures possible to insure full redress and complete security against further Russian outrages."

Russian-Japanese Battles at Shikoku River.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 24.—The following is the official list of the Russian killed and wounded in the fighting at the Shikoku river on Oct. 16th to 19th, as given out today: Killed: 1 general, 237 officers, 17,650 men; wounded, 3 generals, 302 officers, and 24,730 men. Guns lost, 91; machine guns, 37. The Russians captured 32 prisoners, and lost 17 taken by the Japanese.

Tokyo, Oct. 24.—Osama reports further information regarding the battle of Shikoku river and shows the number of Russian prisoners taken as 700. Captured guns 1 on the battle field numbered 1333.

Rome, Oct. 24.—A dispatch from Tokyo states that the Japanese lost at Yaw Tai 8,300 killed, and 25,000 wounded. The Japs lost 31 guns also.

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Important News Notes

Tuesday, Oct. 18.

The Russians stop running and fighting again. Bandon is concentrating his forces for another battle.

During the nine days of fighting the Russian losses were never less than 2,000 a day, and the hospitals at Shikoku are scarcely able to handle the wounded.

The Colorado on 1 minor are beaten in the strike, and are seeking work wherever they can find it.

Plantes noticed two British boats near Canton, and a British gunboat has been dispatched to the scene.

Rev. John G. Hays, of Portland, was robbed of \$500 and his cold watch while on the streets in the bad lands in San Francisco.

Great Britain is to occupy Tibet until her claims are satisfied.

Leonard Foster, of Pine, Oregon, mistook his mother-in-law for a barmaid and shot her. She died almost instantly.

Wednesday, Oct. 24.

The Russians repulse a Japanese attack on Lone Tree Hill.

Port Arthur's fall is thought to be but a question of days.

Both the armies are exhausted and Russia believes that the Japanese offensive movement is worn out.

Two children perished in the fire that burned down the Children's Work Home at Shelbyville, Ill.

The schooner Alva Knudsen was wrecked on the beach at Sausalito. She was on board all the river and a stern wave and drove her ashore.

The battle fleet is on its way to the far East. Part goes by the way of Suez, and part by way of Cape Good Hope.

Thursday, Oct. 25.

Shall Word is after the Portland gunboats again. He will not permit post rooms to be occupied.

The fire damage in the business part of Pasadena, Maryland, to the extent of \$100,000.

Russians in Port Arthur think Kurapatina will relieve them. The Japanese still advance and capture minor positions near Rikong.

During the seven days of battle the Russian casualties are estimated at not less than 25,000.

Formerly, the Japanese loss on the left wing of 5,000.

One dead and another family wounded is the result of a riot between negro and white soldiers at Monterey, Cal. Winslow was the pastor that produced the trouble.

William Hamilton, of Reno, was prevented from checking his wife to death. He intended to kill her and his child, and then commit suicide.

Friday, Oct. 26.

Great Britain has denied Germany the use of Welsh Bay, Africa, for the purpose of landing troops and munitions of war essential to her war against the natives of German South Africa.

A light earthquake was felt at St. Louis. The report of the Union Pacific Railroad is set and shows a net gain of two and a half million dollars for the year.

The Russian and Japanese armies are close to face and preparing for another battle, Oct. 26.

It is estimated that the Japanese have lost 20,000 men during the week at Port Arthur.

On a warship carrying party of 200 the crew who concentrated a force of Japanese, not a single man escaped without being wounded, but one horse escaped without being hit.

The Portland post office is running in defiance of the sheriff.

Saturday, Oct. 27.

The Japanese have retired from Shikoku after what appears to be a defeat.

Both armies are being ordered with men and guns. Each will resume the offensive.

The Emperor of Japan has issued a call on the second reserve and Japs are hurrying home from this and other countries in response.

Forty-one earthquakes have been reported at the John Hopkins University at Baltimore, during the last six months.

A Port D. day, however, has been in the line of nature a heavy rain around the town with a heavy fog. She was mistaken for a ghost and a boat was driven down.

Two detectives were killed and one fatally wounded at St. Louis in a battle with train robber squads. One of the suspects was mortally wounded and admits of having been in a couple of train holdups.
