American Library Ass'n.
During the first week in July, the 27th Annual Conference of the American Library Association will be held in Portland, Oregon. This is an opportunity which must not be neglected by all those interested in the library development and educational progress of our state. The American Library Association had its inception in Philadelphia during the Centennial year, 1876. Since that time yearly conferences have been held covering the country from the Atlantic seaboard to California, from Atlanta, Georgia, in the south, to Montreal, in the north. These meetings are of a strictly practical nature, one object being constantly kept in view, the co-operation among librarians in the interest of better and more economical administration, looking to a more efficient and satisfactory service to the public. Among the subjects usually discussed, are—the best library legislation; how to further the establishment of libraries in every community; library buildings; the wise selection of books; the best methods of cataloging and classification; library records and book keeping; and how to do the educational and missionary features of library work—reaching the young people through the schools and the adults by means of traveling libraries, delivery stations, branches, etc. These conferences of the A. L. A. have aroused an interest in library matters wherever they have been held. Those attending the meetings of this body of earnest men and women working together with definite purpose, cannot fail to be convinced of the necessity of a library to a community as a part of its educational equipment, supplementing the work of the teacher in the public schools, had giving young men and women whose school life must end early the opportunity for self education. Every man and woman interested in good citizenship, in library development, in the general progress of education, in this our state of Oregon, should set aside those first few days in July for a visit to Portland to attend these meetings.

The librarians of Oregon are scattered over a wide area of country. The time is now ripe for organization so that yearly and half yearly meetings may be held of one or two days' duration for better acquaintance with one another, for consideration of plans and discussion of methods. A meeting of all those interested in library work and of all librarians, present and prospective, will be held in the Portland Public Library, corner 7th and Stark Streets, Portland, on the morning of Tuesday, December 27th, at 10 o'clock. Will all those interested in this movement or desiring further information please write immediately to Miss Mary Frances Iam, Librarian of the Portland Public Library, Portland, Oregon.

Reform of the Jury System.
Several Eastern newspapers, and prominent lawyers and other citizens as well, using the Nan Patterson case as the latest object lesson, are urging a reform in the jury system, so that in the case of the death or illness of one or even more jurors the trial can and must still proceed, instead of dropping the trial and having a new one at great cost to taxpayers and much vexation to witnesses and even the lawyers themselves. Many New York lawyers, aided by the endorsement of several justices of the supreme court, county judges, and some of the justices of the Supreme Court of the United States, are to make efforts this winter at Albany to have a constitutional amendment proposed that will effect this reform. One plan is to provide for verdicts by three-fourths of a jury, nine of the twelve. This is one method of doing away with hung juries that is often proposed, and almost everybody except some lawyers, seems to agree that it would be a sensible move, and yet legislatures neglect to act upon it. Many, however, would object to its application to first-degree murder cases, and as to them it is not likely soon to be adopted, if at all.

Another proposed amendment will provide that whenever a jury has been selected to try a criminal case, the judge in his discretion may have from one to six additional jurors drawn, as a supplemental jury, who shall listen to the testimony, and be prepared to take the place of one or more jurors who may become incapacitated. This we think faulty in leaving the matter to the discretion or caprice of a judge, and also because it is unnecessary to have twelve men decide any case. A less number, in case one or more jurors become unable to serve, will do just as well, and the constitutions of the states ought so to provide. This should be the next constitutional amendment submitted to the people of Oregon.—Oregon Journal.

Gold exports for November reached the wholly unprecedented total for that month of \$25,000,000. This movement is explained partly by the fact that, owing to peculiar conditions in Germany and elsewhere abroad, our bankers can make it profitable to ship gold, and further, that large lines of bonds, as the new Pennsylvania and Rock Island issues, have been bought in London, only to be quickly resold in this country to secure the premium. It would certainly be a mistake to infer from the exports of gold that the balance of trade in European markets is against us. We are not paying gold abroad; we are lending it.—Oregon Journal.
