## EDITORIAL

The Recorder wishes its patrons and friends a happy and prosperous New Year.

It is said that Andrew Carnegie pays ten per cent premium to all the employees on his Scottish estate who practice entire abstinence from intoxicating liquors. This is commendable in Carnegie and a source of profit no doubt to many of his employees, but to those who have been drinkers, perhaps the greatest premium is in the saving that comes through abstinence. We have known men who could have been wealthy if they had saved what they squandered in drink. Two or three dollars a day, spent for intoxicants, would, if saved, make a handsome premium at the end of each year; that amount is but small when compared with what the wealthy drinkers spend.

R. W. Ballard was a Bandon visitor last Monday, and gave us the result of the stockholders' meeting of the Prosper Cannery Co., which met last week. Officers were chosen as follows: R. W. Ballard, President; John Nielson, Secretary and Treasurer. The directors chosen were: J. A. Morrison, Charles Ashton, John Walstrom, Sam Nass and N. A. Pederson. The company has disposed of the season's catch, and made a handsome profit out of their venture. This can be a benefit to the fishermen of the Coquille, all of whom have profited by reason of its existence, as it was a means of raising the price of fish, and in this all received a gain, while those who ventured their money in the cannery shared in both profits.

## Offer Made to Move North Bend Plant to Sellwood.

The Sellwood Board of Trade, D. M. Donogh, president, last night considered a proposition from T. W. Clark, of North Bend, Or., to move his six-set woolen mill to Sellwood and locate it on the old site of the Portland Woolen Mills. The offer from Mr. Clark came through E. L. Thompson, who indorses Mr. Clark and offers to assist in securing the grounds. Mr. Thompson, representing the Portland Woolen Mills, stated the ground could be secured for such a purpose. Mr. Clark is represented as having operated a woolen mill at Bandon, Or., which he moved to North Bend, but now desires to locate in Portland.

The Board of Trade indorses the project, and appointed D. M. Donogh, F. C. Kirehem, D. P. Thompson, J. W. Campbell and Mr. Compton as a committee to confer with Mr. Clark and E. L. Thompson concerning the location of the mills, and to ascertain what is required of the people of Sellwood in order to secure it.—Oregonian.

## Another Mammoth Exhibition Palace.

In order to provide for the best of the overwhelming array of exhibitors who wish to participate in the Lewis and Clark Exposition, it has been necessary to make a readjustment of the exhibit buildings and to provide for 30,000 square feet of additional space. This space will be added to the new exhibit palace recently provided by the executive board, so that the building will contain 90,000 feet of floor space, and equal in size the Agricultural Palace, the largest building at the Exposition. With this additional space it will be possible to provide for all exhibitors.

The new structure will be known as the Palace of Manufactures, Liberal Arts, and Varied Industries. It will be located near the Plaza of States, due east of the Agricultural Palace. The cost will be about \$50,000, and bids for the construction work will be called for at an early date.

The readjustment made necessary by the overwhelming demand for exhibit space will result in the Foreign Exhibits building being given over exclusively to Oriental exhibitors, in stead of being used to house the displays from all nations, as was originally the plan. In this building will be the exhibits from Siam, Corea, East Indies, Turkey, Siberia, Persia, Egypt, Japan and China. The building formerly designed for Liberal Arts will be called the European building, and will contain exhibits from Great Britain, Germany, France, Italy, Russia, Denmark, Sweden, Austria, Switzerland, Hungary and Belgium. The educational exhibit will be located in the new Palace of Manufactures, Liberal Arts and Varied Industries.
