EDITORIAL

The proposed amendment to the Local Option Law has been defeated. The Denver, Colorado, election fraud investigation is taking another turn now and both Republicans and Democrats are identifying their respective ballots among those which have been declared fraudulent by the experts engaged in the investigation. It will now be in order to investigate the investigators and their experts. There may be more fraud in that quarter than there was at the polls.

We noticed a statement that the road supervisors of Linn county had set a date upon which to meet with the members of their county court for the purpose of discussing road construction with a view to bettering the highways in the county. This seems to be a logical plan and it might be beneficial to supervisors of other counties to get together and see if some uniform plan, looking toward better road construction, could not be arrived at.

The Legislature is after the cigarette with a long pole but it is not long enough to reach the vital part. The proposed bill makes it a misdemeanor to sell or give cigarettes, or anything pertaining thereto to persons under 21 years of age, but as the deadly thing is of no use whatever to the human family, the bill should make it a misdemeanor to sell or give them or anything pertaining thereto to any person. The bill should be prohibitive.

Portland officials have won in their effort to exclude women from the saloons. This is a good fight and their action is commendable, but perhaps it does not go far enough. If the saloon is not a fit place for a woman, neither is it a proper place for a man, and it should be relegated to the past and not be permitted to exist. Its influence is demoralizing to character and the influence of alcoholic beverages upon the human system is such as to bring untimely death, hence there is nothing that can be urged in perpetuation of the saloon that offers a good excuse for its existence. It kills time, destroys wealth, and murders soul and body.

Socialism in Kansas.

We are accustomed to the announcement of novel governmental doctrine from the State of Kansas. Her notable public men have been responsible for the promulgation of various socialistic schemes, which, in the main, have been regarded by the rest of the country with some degree of curiosity, but have hardly been accorded serious recognition. The fact that ideas of this character have emanated largely from the ranks of Populism that a few years ago flourished so vigorously in the Sunflower State has detracted somewhat from their public appreciation; but now we have a proposal from a conservative Republican Governor that goes quite beyond any thing hitherto suggested. In Governor Hoch's message to the Kansas Legislature, just convened, he called attention to the monopolization of the state's supply of natural gas and oil quite to the public detriment.

It is suggested that the Legislature make special effort to devise means whereby nature's supply of natural gas in the state may not be diverted without her boundaries for the development of outside manufacturers; but with reference to the preservation of the oil industry, which is threatened by monopoly in greater measure, the Governor "goes much further." He may best speak for himself: "Our oil industries are also in jeopardy. Rather, therefore, than permit the great monopolies to rob us of the vast reservoirs of oil that have been stored by the Creator beneath our soil, I am inclined to waive my objection to the socialistic phase of this subject, and recommend the establishment of an oil refinery of our own in our state for the preservation of our wealth and the protection of our interests."

It is difficult to say what view the Legislature will take of this suggestion, but from the fact that a few years ago state action dissipated the power of the twine monopoly, and considering the aptitude of Kansas people to do the unexpected, we are disposed to watch the outcome with more than ordinary interest.—Telegram.
