WINTER SCHEDULE. Leave Roseburg at 6 A.M., daily. Arrive at Coquille at 8 A.M. Leave Coquille at 4 A.M., daily. Arrive at Roseburg at 10 A.M.

Furthermore we respectfully state that the above monthly schedule has been submitted to the directors of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company.

We further set forth the schedule of Route No. 73,100, between Coquille and Bandon, as follows: Leave Coquille at 7 A.M., daily. Arrive at Bandon at 11 A.M. Leave Bandon at 1 P.M., daily. Arrive at Coquille at 5 P.M.

The present mail carrier on this route is willing to carry the mail as per schedule above indicated, between said offices at Coquille and Bandon, and the change will come into effect on the above schedule six days hence.

We further most respectfully ask that you give us also a Sunday mail between Bandon and Coquille. The boats carrying the mails make the runs on Sundays as on other days, and the business of this town certainly is extensive enough to justify the very small additional expense necessary for the extra mail.

We are informed and believe that all mails passing out over Route No. 73,100, arriving at Roseburg about 6 o'clock P.M., are permitted to remain in the offices at that point for a period of twelve hours, or until following day before being started for final destination.

Whereas, according to the present summer schedule of the U.S. Mail for said above named post office, said mail leaves Roseburg, Oregon, at 6 o'clock A.M., daily, arriving at Myrtle Point, Oregon, at 8 o'clock P.M. of the same day, where it is held over until 7 o'clock A.M. of the following day, thereby causing an unnecessary delay of 11 hours at Myrtle Point.

Whereas, said mail service would be greatly improved, and far more beneficial to the patrons of this office, were the present route from Roseburg to Myrtle Point extended via the present route from Myrtle Point to Coquille, instead of having said mail carried between Myrtle Point and Coquille by boat service.
