### EDITORIAL

Panama is a very unhealthy locality, but diseases incident to the place are not only of a physical nature, but seem to attack the morals as well. The effluvia that pervaded the atmosphere from French occupation of the Panama canal, is hardly blown away before a request comes from President Roosevelt for the resignation of the Panama Commissioners, which at least will indicate that the great ditch will become the grave of dead hopes, while rotten morals will probably find a resting place there also. ### Captain and Crew of C A Klose Rescued

San Pedro, Mar. 30.—The captain and crew of the schooner C. A. Klose abandoned at sea in a waterlogged condition, were picked up by the schooner Polaris, which arrived here yesterday. All hands are reported well.

The Klose was abandoned March 26 ten miles off the Oregon shore. Shortly after leaving the Columbia river she sprung a leak. She filled rapidly and soon became waterlogged and unmanageable. The crew took to the rigging and remained there for a day and night, when the Polaris from Portland, was sighted. In response to a signal she came along side the Klose, launched a boat in the heavy sea, and after many efforts succeeded in taking off the derelict's crew.

Captain Wagner and the eight men with him are said to be none the worse for their experience. The suffering, they say, was very mild, under the circumstances.

### Centennial Notes.

"Hit the Trail" at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, opening in Portland June 1.

Captive balloons, airships and an aerodrome will prove very interesting features of the Lewis and Clark Exposition. A number of flying costumed aerobics are being arranged.

Two hundred Igorrotes, Moros, Negritos and Visayans will sail from the Philippine Islands this week for Portland, where they are to participate in the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

A feature of the Government Fisheries exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Exposition will be a miniature reproduction of the Columbia river, illustrating the various methods of catching and spawning salmon.

Mrs. Eliza Warren, the oldest living white child who was with the famous Marquis Whitman expedition and a survivor of the Whitman massacre, will visit the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

Ventura county, (California), famous for its marvelous production of bees, beans and United States senatorial aspirants, will make a thorough and distinctive exhibit in the California building at the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

Oregonian: Another bomb has done its deadly work in Russia. The Warsaw Chief of Police, a cruel, relentless persecutor of the people, is the victim. **The Venice of America.**  
South of Santa Monica and north of Playa del Rey, in Southern California, lies a narrow stretch of land, directly on the ocean front, for which nature has done much. But during the past months man has been busy beautifying and improving the spot, making it one of the most beautiful resorts in the world.

Venice is the name given to this ideal locality, and truly a modern Venice it seems with its miles upon miles of salt water canals, with its stately Venetian palaces, business blocks and places of amusement; and while the work is by no means finished, a fair idea of the rare attractiveness of the place is obtained by a visit to it.

It is at this enchanted spot, in a pavilion seating 3000 people, built on the pier away beyond the line of breakers, where the breezes are always cool, and where everything conspires to make the hours pleasant that the great Venice Assembly is to be held during July and August of 1905. Benj. Fay Mills, whose name is a household word throughout America, has been elected President of the Association. The Vice Presidents who have accepted their election include the Hon. George C. Pardee, Governor of California, the Hon. Franklin K. Lane, the Hon. William E. Smythe, justly called the father of National Irrigation, Mr. Abbot Kinney, and the Hon. George C. Perkins, United States Senator from California.

First. The plan includes a series of national sociological congresses on a scale never before attempted in America, excepting at the World's Parliament in Chicago, in 1893.

Second. A Summer University at which all the lighter branches are to be taught, including a School of Modern Languages, a School of Music, a School of Expression, a School of Ethics, and a School of Nature Study.

Third. A series of lectures, concerts, dramas, and other entertainments of the highest class, by participants of national reputation.

Fourth. Exhilarating recreation in the form of pure and ennobling amusement. Daily concerts by one of the finest bands in the world, entertainments by the trained amateur society, and a general effort to promote good fellowship among those fortunate enough to be present.

Fifth. Every Sunday morning a great undenominational religious service will be held in the auditorium, with the finest sacred music, and with sermons by representatives of the various religious faiths.

To give an idea of the scope of the work outlined, it may perhaps be said that in the first division, the World's Parliament, it is proposed to hold nine great assemblies or congresses beginning July Fourth with a California Congress, at which it is hoped that Governor Pardee will preside. Others to be invited include U. S. Senators Perkins and Flint, and the Hon. William E. Smythe.

A Patriotic Congress will meet to consider national and international interests. The President of the United States will be invited by an influential committee, and strong hopes are entertained that he will be able to accept the invitation. Secretary Taft will be invited to speak on "Our Colonial Problems," and the attendance of other speakers of the greatest prominence will be solicited.

A Reform Congress at which Mr. Albert Shaw, Gov. Alva Adams, Miss Ida Tarbell, Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin, Mr. Thomas J. Lawson, Mr. Clarence Arrow, and others, will be invited.

Other Congresses—one of which is to be in the interest of Universal Peace, another to be known as the Economic Congress, another the Congress of Religions, then a Philanthropic Congress, Educational Congress, and the Congress of Psychic Research will follow in the order named, at which speakers of world-wide fame and of varying views will be invited to give free, courteous expressions to their conflicting opinions.
