In order to get information from a reliable source we addressed a note of inquiry to the Clerk of Curry County some days ago, and I below we give the reply: Gold Beach, Ore., April 21st, 1905. Mr. D. E. Sitt, Bandon, Ore. Dear Sir: Yours of the 15th received, and in reply will say that I have noticed some effects of the prohibition in this County. I don't see why any community would choose to return to "twit" after trying the "dry." It seems a little severe to compel a full grown man to do something he does not want to do—or rather, to prohibit him from doing what he desires to do, but in this instance it is the best thing for him and he should be manly enough to admit it and vote for prohibition. I have not the time nor ability to write an article on this subject, but will say that the changes made by prohibiting here are very considerable and everybody rejoices except the dealers in liquor, and even they acknowledge that the present condition is good.

Curtis Snook, dentist, has removed both office and residence from Coquille to Bandon. The Doctor will be in his office next to the Town Hall during May, and will operate on school children at half price. Jetty Work to Start. D. M. Charlson, who is in charge of the government property here, put seven men to work last Monday morning doing preparatory work in order to have everything in readiness by the time the contract is let for the extension of the North jetty. Captain J. H. Polhemus, of Portland, was here some three weeks ago taking a survey of the situation in connection with the proposed work, and the advertisement for bids to contract is expected to appear any time now, as it is expected that work on the jetty will begin by the 1st of July. The work now under way is to repair the wharf, to get the hoisting engine in readiness, likewise the pile driver and locomotive, and any other arrangements necessary to prosecute the work. The amount set apart for jetty work on the Coquille improvement, is \$55,000, which will probably be sufficient to finish the work designed on the North jetty. If the contract is let and work commences in July, it will be a start of about two months earlier than usual, and the work will continue for about eighteen months or two years before the sum will be expended. This will help to relieve times at Bandon during that period, and by that time other institutions employing labor are expected to be under way of construction.

Prohibition Wins Out.

Judge Hamilton's decision terminating the injunction against enforcing prohibition in Coos County was handed down by Judge Harris at Coquille Friday. This will most likely settle the question in Coos county except in the case of Marshfield. A special meeting of the County Court will be called to make the necessary order to close the saloons, ten days' notice being required. Marshfield had her charter amended by the last Legislature, allowing her the power to license and regulate the liquor license within her limits, and it remains to be seen whether that act is legal, unless the remainder of the county concludes to submit and be imposed upon. Schooner Del Norte Wrecked. On last Friday morning between the hours of two and three o'clock, the steamer Sea Foam, 25 hours out from Astoria, lumber laden and bound for San Francisco, when about six miles off the Coquille, ran into the schooner Del Norte which was lying off shore waiting to get into harbor. After the collision, Captain Franz of the Del Norte ran down into the cabin and finding that the water was pouring into his vessel he returned to the deck and ordered the boat made ready to leave the vessel, and also requested Captain Miller of the Sea Foam to stand by. The Del Norte filled so rapidly that in about ten minutes she came over and sank leaving only the side of the vessel and the end of one mast above water. In the meantime Captain Franz and the crew of four men launched a boat and were picked up by the Sea Foam. The Sea Foam got a line to the schooner, but had none of sufficient strength to pull her up, hence she lay by and both vessels floated in toward the shore. Captain Miller claims that a heavy fog kept him from seeing the schooner's lights, and that he did not hear her fog horn, while Captain Franz claims he saw the lights of the Sea Foam for ten minutes before she struck. However, a board of inquiry will have that proposition to wrestle with. The whistle of the Sea Foam was heard by the lookout during the collision, but it was not known that a collision had taken place until Captain Franz came ashore, in the morning, when he communicated with the owners and also with the tug Columbia, at Empire City, and the tug was engaged to come down to tow the wreck into Coos Bay. Keeper Johnson and crew went out to render what assistance they could in making lines fast, etc., and the tug Columbia started with her tow Saturday evening for Coos Bay, which was reached Sunday evening after a stage of 28 hours towing. The result at Coos Bay is told in the following which we clip from the Coast Mail: "The mangled remains of the schooner Del Norte, which was run down by the steamer Sea Foam off the mouth of the Coquille Saturday morning, now lie on the rocks at Coos head. The tug Columbia which went after her, succeeded in towing her in over her, but when she came to the little schooner turned bottom up and the tug lost her hold on her, either through the parting of the hawsers or the pulling out of the mast, and was unable to pick her up again. The officers of the Alliance reported that the hull was lying on the rocks toward the south at Co's head, while the spars and upper works were ashore farther in."
