From Chicago comes the news that it is proposed to present parents of school children who strike in sympathy with other strikes.

Admiral Rojestvensky is keeping his movements secret. The Japanese are also on the sly. Eleven yachts representing America, England and Germany are ready to race across the Atlantic Ocean for the Kaiser's cup.

The conductors of America closed their 13th biennial session at Portland, and leave for home. Many sheep are being poisoned on the range in the southwestern part of Grant County.

Captain T. J. Morris of the schooner A. F. Coates grabbed a burglar who was trying to steal from the schooner, and held him till the police relieved him of his charge at Portland.

Rejoystvensky's and Nebogoff's squadrons are united. News from Tokio states that the plague has broken out at Harbin, and that 300 deaths occur daily from it.

Polk County has a baby resident who is over 105 years old, being born in 1799. Refundation petitions were filed to stop the appropriations for normal schools today, and this throws the state upon a credit basis.

Tacoma leads at baseball in the Pacific Coast League and Portland stands at the foot of the class, this year, again.

Secretary Taft proposes buying supplies for the Panama Canal in open market, so that American manufacturers will not have a chance to exploit the government.
