EDITORIAL.

Persons interested in knowing the ins and outs of the nefarious financial brigands of the country, should secure the *Recorder*, published on May 20, in which Thomas W. Lawson will publish his first exposure in the story "Frenzied Finance."

Occasionally we read of horrid crimes committed by some person whose brain is crazed with excessive drink, and from the nice distinction the writer makes, one would conclude that he was afraid he might injure the whiskey traffic or bring reproach upon it. Instead of calling it drunken insanity, it is "temporary insanity caused by drink."

The local option law enacted in force in Oregon, and the whiskey traffic is outlawed in Coos County, but there are some twenty or more saloons run in open defiance of law. What other class of business would be permitted to do so? Why has not the smuggler, the counterfeiter, and the thief the same right to immunity? Oh! they are law breakers.

The "wets" were abroad Sunday night; at least, there was one or two stranded on the road leading south from town, and from the groans that issued from the vicinity of the stranded bulk, one would conclude that he had taken more tangle foot than was congenial to his comfort and locomotion. Who were the parties? The argument that a town must endure the damning influence of the whiskey traffic in order to be prosperous, will not bear the searching light of investigation. Centennial News.

Hit the Trail at the Lewis and Clark Exposition, opening in Portland, June 1.

Saturday, August 12, has been selected as Aeronautic Day at the Lewis and Clark Exposition.

Missouri Day at the Lewis and Clark Exposition has been changed from August 17 to September 14. Governor Joseph W. Folk of the "Show Me" state will attend.

Colorado will have a building at the Lewis and Clark Exposition. The structure is now well under way and will be completed by June 1. While small, it is one of the most attractive of the state buildings.

Two new concessions are announced for the Trail—the Old Southern Plantation and the Mirror Maze. Work upon this amusement thoroughfare is progressing favorably, and all the concessions will be ready to receive the public before opening day.

Nearly all of the exhibits for the Palace of Manufactures, Liberal Arts and Varied Industries at the Lewis and Clark Exposition are installed. The installation in other buildings is progressing rapidly.

Fifteen organ recitals will be held in the Auditorium of the Lewis and Clark Exposition between June 10 and September 25. All recitals will be given at night, and will be arranged by Professor H. W. Grohlich, organist of St. David's Episcopal Church. Prominent organists will participate.

Delegates to the Convention of the Order of Railway Conductors, two thousand strong, with wives and families, were in attendance at the Lewis and Clark Exposition grounds, Sunday, May 14th. A sacred concert occurred during the noon hour, after which the assemblage retired to the American Inn, where they were the guests of the Exposition. Royal Chinook salmon, fresh from the streams of Oregon was served. The remainder of the menu consisted of salads, cold meats, sandwiches of various sorts, coffee, milk, ice cream and assorted cakes.
