Important News Notes. Tuesday, Sept. 12. The Japanese battleship, Mikasa, Admiral Togo's flagship, sunk with her entire complement of officers and men. From some unknown cause she caught fire and the after magazine exploded. Admiral Togo was not on board.

Wednesday, Sept. 13. Baron Komura, the Japanese Peace Envoy, who was reported ill, is suffering from typhoid fever at New York. It is stated that the price for wool will not fall off for some time.

Thursday, Sept. 14. Patrick A. Collins, Mayor of Boston, died at 114 Spring St., Va. Dick Bennett Darrell was shot and killed by Charles Underwood on the Deschutes river.

Friday, Sept. 15. Incendiary fire destroyed a building at Los Angeles, and while the flames were being subdued a fire containing \$120,000. The fire contained \$200 in gold and the rest in bonds. They took the gold and threw the bag in the fire, but it was recovered before the contents were destroyed.

Saturday, Sept. 16. The barquentine Arago is ashore at Clatsop spit, near the mouth of the Columbia. Five men were killed by an explosion in a Michigan sawmill, and eight or ten others were injured.
