Philomath College Opening.

The opening program of Philomath College, Sept. 26th, was given to an appreciative audience of students, patrons and citizens. In his own pleasing manner Bishop Caffery offered most valuable advice toward the making of a strong character. Miss Gertrude Johnson, teacher of oratory, held the audience spell bound during an excellent reading. Miss Edith Sheak, teacher of vocal music, and Mrs. Ethel White of piano, furnished numbers on the program.

The motto of Philomath College is "Scholarship for Service," and its object is to place within the reach of every young person the possibility of a thorough college education. Its students are taught that both mental and manual labor are honorable. The school is decidedly Christian, but strictly non-sectarian. An unusually helpful moral atmosphere prevails in this institution.

A wing three stories high has been added to the main brick building, and the chapel and commercial rooms are enlarged, adding materially to the facilities of the school.

Ellery's Band, which has been engaged to play during the closing weeks of the Lewis and Clark Exposition, has made the hit of the season. Concerts are given, free to all, twice daily, and are largely attended.

Myrtle Point Enterprise: O. S. Coleman, while digging a well on his place on the East Fork, about three miles from town, was surprised to discover particles of gold. Investigation showed it existed in considerable quantities, and conditions indicated that the well, which is about thirty feet down, is in an old river bed. Mr. Coleman will dig another well near the present one and prospect further.

The Williamson Verdict.

Mr. Williamson, Mr. Biggs and Dr. Gasner are found guilty on their third trial. They were charged with subornation of perjury in procuring many persons to make false affidavits for the purpose of taking up timberland claims in Crook County. The lands were to be transferred to them afterwards. The charges were true. There never was a real doubt in any one's mind that they were true; but there was a serious question as to whether an Oregon jury could be found that would convict. Two juries failed, because certain of their members believed that the land laws were made to be broken, or, if broken, that the practice was universal, and the Government was making invidious discrimination when it singled out these defendants for punishment. Grabbing the Government land is a business nearly everybody has been in, or, if not, has regarded with toleration. Why make an example of a Representative in Congress, and his two business associates, when hundreds of others have been doing the same thing?

The Government has made an example of these defendants because it thought that the lesson to be taught by their conviction would create a profound impression, and that it would do much to stop the wholesale theft of its public domain. A Congressman has even a higher duty than a private citizen in careful observance of law; and, if he is remiss, he does more to blurt the common conscience and lower the general respect for law. This was the motive for the vigorous and persistent prosecution of Williamson, Biggs and Gasner. They had broken the law. The testimony that they had abundant and convincing. The Government had—it could have—no prejudice to satisfy, no feeling of any kind, except that it had a duty to perform, and must perform it. So it has done.

The days of land grabbing in Oregon and in the Nation are over. The days of retribution for the land grabber are here. The public lands will be held now for the honest settler, for whom they were intended.—Oregonian.

Railroad news still keeps coming, and we hope that the dirt may soon be moving in evidence that the movers mean business. The Coast Mail of Saturday gave the following as a telegram from Portland: "Great interest grows out of the presence here of a prominent S. P. official from San Francisco, giving full authenticity to the report that his company will build into Coos Bay. He says that the present survey is corroborative of former estimates and surveys, and that work will proceed within thirty days."

Important News Notes

TUESDAY, Sept. 26.
Secretary of Treasury Shaw has resigned his position in the Cabinet, and it is stated will become a candidate for President.

There was a terrific typhoon at Manila. The native district was swept away and 8000 are homeless. Hundreds are injured, and a number reported killed.

Two only out of thirty applicants who applied yesterday for permission to practice optometry, in Oregon, passed. Opticians will not be so plentiful in future.

Japan and England have entered into a treaty for the maintenance of peace in Asia. A fire at Spokane did \$300,000 damage.

A Colfax Justice of the Peace has been arrested for violation of the game law. He had a trunk packed with 150 prairie chickens.

WEEDNESDAY, Sept. 27.
A gunboat was sunk, garison houses were destroyed, and supplies were ruined by the storm at Manila.

The government house at Panama was destroyed by fire. But little of the contents was saved.

The Car and the Emperor of Germany will form a compact to resist the yellow races of Asia.

A train wreck occurred in Colorado, on the Rio Grande, in which many passengers were injured.

An express messenger and a former employee fought a duel in a Wabash express car in Illinois. Both were fatally wounded.

Thomas Taylor, a farmer of Hale, Oregon was killed by a large boulder rolling over him.

Governor Chamberlain is a candidate for re-election as Governor of Oregon.

THURSDAY, Sept. 28.
Secretary of Treasury Shaw says that the money system lacks elasticity, and will lead to panic.

Count Witte, the Russian Peace Envoy, arrived home and was received with cheers by a large crowd at St. Peterburg.

Ninety tons of dynamite was exploded in the Suez canal. The dynamite was part of the cargo of the British steamer Chertoff which sank in the canal.

The foreign attaches to the Russian army had farewell to Commander-in-Chief Linavich, at Gushu Pass, and left for their native countries.

General Stoesel, of Port Arthur fame, was stricken by paralysis, the whole left side being affected.

The Japanese champion wrestler weighs 400 pounds.

FRIDAY, Sept. 29.
A crowded tenement in New York was fired by a bomb containing dynamite and oil.

Many lives were lost and vessels wrecked by the typhoon in Luzon and surrounding islands. The east-bound cutter Leyte was wrecked and 11 Americans and 24 natives drowned.

The schooner Roanoke, the largest ship built in American waters, was destroyed by fire at New Caledonia. She had 385 tons of chrome oil aboard when the fire broke out.

Four men were arrested at Castle Rock, Wash., charged with killing an unknown man at Chehalis.

David E. Sherick, former Auditor of Indiana has been arrested charged with the embezzlement of \$20,000.

A woman named Kate Daly was shot and fatally wounded, in Sunset Park, Brooklyn, by her escort, Vincent Girbone.

SATURDAY, Sept. 30.
President Roosevelt's vacation has ended, and he has gone to his post at Washington.

The attendance at the Exposition is very large today, 38,500 having entered by 2:30 o'clock.

A gold bearing ledge has been discovered on Broken Top Mountain, west of Ladshaw, Oregon.

Four Primrose men who made unwilling witnesses in the Williamson trial, have been indicted.

Williamson, Gasner and Biggs, of land fraud fame, have been found guilty as charged in the indictment.

Germany is making systematic preparations for war.

An Iowa banker lost his life in an auto accident. He lost control of his machine while descending a hill.
