OREGON IS LAUNCHED

New Schooner Built at Prosper is Finest of its Kind Constructed on This River.

PROSPER, OREGON, October 31st.—The launching of the new schooner at this place, Saturday, was a decided success, and owing to the beautiful weather, crowds from different points along the river, transported by the tug Triumph and steamer Favorite, gathered to witness the event. About noon the new vessel slid gracefully into the water, while Miss Sara Fahy dashed the bottle of wine on the vessel's bow, saying, "I christen thee, Oregon." The Oregon is certainly a credit to the builder, Mr. E. Heukendorff, well known on Coos Bay and the Coquille. She is a staunch and seaworthy craft, and one of the finest of the kind built on the river: is 150 feet in length, 34 feet beam, with a depth of 10 feet, and will carry 375 M feet of lumber. She is owned and managed principally by people on the river, and will go on the Coquille-San Francisco run. Capt. Anderson, one of the best known navigators on the coast will have charge and command of the new vessel.

Senator Fulton arrived in Marshfield last Thursday, on the Alliance, and was given a great ovation. Saturday he visited Coquille and was given a rousing reception at that place. The Senator is making this trip to study conditions as they exist at the Coos Bay and Coquille harbors; to visit the Government works and investigate the needs of the people of this section in the way of Government improvements.

WORK ON NORTH JETTY COMMENCED.

Coquille Bar Will be Greatly Improved and Bandon-Coquille Shipping Benefited.

Last week Contractors Wakefield and Jacobson commenced actual construction work on the north jetty, and it will be pushed to completion as rapidly as the nature of the work will permit.

The contractors have been busy the past three months getting their equipment ready for the work. They have built 2100 feet of new track on the north side of the river, and about 2300 feet on the south side. The rock used in the construction work will be taken from the old Tupper Rock in the south part of town. It will be transported across the river by means of scows. Two scow loads (400 tons) are now being moved daily, and later it is expected that 600 tons daily can be handled. The contractors have in use two locomotives and five "donkey" engines. One derrick is now being used at Tupper Rock and another one is being built which will greatly aid to the facilities for moving the rock for the jetty.

The contractors estimate that it will take about a year to complete the improvements now in progress. \$55,000 was appropriated by the Government for the improvement of the Coquille River. The principal work is the extension of the north jetty 555 feet seaward. The work of driving now piling and repairing the old work is now in progress and the rocking was commenced last Thursday.

The new jetty will mean much to Bandon and the Coquille river shipping and one steamboat man puts it: "Give us twenty one feet of water on the Coquille bar and we will not slip all that we have on hand."

THE SIMPSON OPTION

Rumor That Option Has Been Given on All Holdings in Coos and Douglas.

There is a rumor that Capt. Simpson has given an option on all his holdings in Coos and Douglas counties. It is understood that this news came yesterday with the telegram from San Francisco, and that the new purchaser will be here on the next Breakwater. This includes everything except the book accounts.
