## DEPUTY FISH WARDEN WEBSTER VISITS BANDON.

Has Opinions of His Own Regarding Propagation.

H. A. Webster, Deputy Fish Warden, of Oregon City, was in town the first of the week on business connected with his office, and Mr. Webster reports that the prospect is excellent for a good take of salmon eggs at the hatchery on the south fork of Coos river. Already 1,500,000 have been taken and it is estimated that 6,500,000 (all that the hatchery is able to handle) will be secured this season. Last year two million Chinook eggs were taken from South Coos to the north fork of the Coquille, and were there hatched and turned loose. This year they expect to do the same unless prevented from so doing by the splash or flood dams which have been built this year on the north fork of the Coquille. Mr. Webster left here yesterday morning for the North Fork where he goes to inspect the dams and investigate what effect they will have on fry that might be planted. He expressed a fear that the rush of water, logs and debris might kill the fish, but thinks if it is possible, it would be much better to put the young salmon in the upper river than in tide water.

Mr. Webster believes that the present method of conducting the artificial propagation of salmon is not a success, except in the case of the Hume hatchery at Rogue river. He thinks that the young fry are liberated from the hatcheries at too tender an age, and being unable to take care of themselves are devoured by their enemies by the million. The young salmon should be retained a few months longer, he thinks, and fed, until they are about three inches long. At present the fry are turned loose when about one and one quarter inches long, and with only a limited power of locomotion, fall easy prey to numerous enemies.

At the Hume hatchery from 1899 to 1903, the fry were fed until from three to six inches in length, and Hume, in this manner, increased the spring pack of Chinook salmon from 2,500 cases to 16,000.

## Bandon Foundry and Machine Shop.

One of the enterprises in Bandon that is coming to the front at a lively pace is the Bandon Foundry and Machine Shop. Mr. A. Garfield, the proprietor, started this business in a small way about five years ago with comparatively nothing, but by strict attention to business has worked up a splendid trade which is steadily increasing. He has made it a point not to buy any "cheap-John" machinery, and when he buys a new piece he gets the latest improved and the best that money will purchase. Only a short time ago a new drill press and iron planer were added to his equipment. They are the best machines made and the best in this part of the state. His plant is equipped for doing all kinds of pattern work, foundry work, casting, etc. Last week he turned out a saw mill outfit, complete, for Smith Bros., who have a large ranch near Hare, Curry County, who are putting in the mill to saw their own fencing and barn lumber. When Mr. Garfield started his foundry the wise ones told him he would not earn his salt. Now he has one of the best plants in this part of the country, and a business that is constantly growing. He makes a specialty of mill and steamboat work, and will build machines to order.

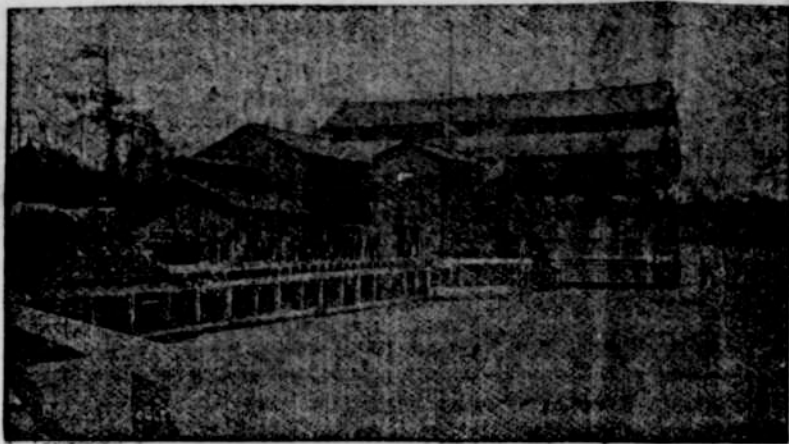

## NEW SHINGLE MILL TO START UP SOON.

Bandon Manufacturing Company Plant Expect to Commence Business Dec. 1st.



The Bandon Manufacturing Co.'s building is a lively place these days, a force of workmen being kept busy installing the new machinery which arrived on the Elizabeth last week. It is estimated that about three weeks' time will be required to get the machinery all set up and the plant ready for operation. For the present the Company will devote their time to the manufacturing of white and red cedar shingles, although they expect to branch out in other lines in time. Two upright saws, with a capacity of 100,000 feet daily are being put in, and two additional saws will be installed a little later. A 55 h. p. engine will furnish the power, and a Dutch oven is being built this week with a system of elevators that will handle the sawdust from every part of the mill. The drag saw, steam feed boiler, and combination cut-off and boiler will soon be placed in position. The company will also put in a dynamo and the plant will be lighted by electricity. They express a willingness to put in a large electric plant and furnish the town with lights, if enough lights would be taken to justify the expense. The town needs this improvement, and this would be a good opportunity to secure it, as this company, under the circumstances, could probably furnish light cheaper than an outside concern would be able to do.

The Bandon Manufacturing Co. is owned by local men, E. Dyer, E. A. Philpott and E. B. Fish, and we predict for the firm a large and successful business. The Shingle Mill itself will give employment to a dozen men, besides making an additional market for white and red cedar logs.

## SOUTH JETTY IS NEEDED AT COOS BAY.

Fulton Will Endeavor to Get Appropriation For Suction Dredge For Coos and Coquille.

Astoria, Oct. 31.—Special to Oregonian. Senator Fulton and Collector Robb returned this afternoon from Coos Bay, where the Senator went to confer with the residents of that section regarding needed river and harbor improvements. Regarding what work he will recommend, Senator Fulton said this evening: "We took soundings as we crossed the bar going into Coos Bay about one hour before high tide, and found 26 feet on the shoal, which is about 300 yards in width. I am satisfied that with the construction of a south jetty not to exceed a mile in length, there would soon be 30 feet of water at low tide. The interior of the bay requires dredging, especially at two particular points. I believe that with a slight amount of dredging Coos Bay can be made one of the finest

harbors on the coast, and with the construction of the proposed south jetty, its entrance can be made an exceptionally good one. "At the mouth of the Coquille river there is a south jetty, and the work of constructing a north jetty is now in progress. There is at present 15 feet of water on the bar at high tide, and the channel is constantly improving. Dredging is, however, required inside the river, as it is impossible for laden sea craft to navigate as far as Coquille City without working the tides, all because of three principal shoals, which can be removed at slight expense. "I shall endeavor to secure an appropriation for the construction of the proposed south jetty at Coos Bay and for the building and operation of a suction dredge, which can be used at Coos Bay and at Coquille river."

## Plant Loses Wheel.

Just as the Plant was leaving the dock here yesterday afternoon to start for San Francisco, her voyage came to an abrupt termination. There was a tug and a jar, and Captain Nelson found his vessel without anything with which to kick the water. Either the propeller dropped off or the blades were stripped from it by some floating submerged log. The steamer was hauled back to the dock and will be unable to proceed on her voyage without considerable delay. It is likely that a great part of her cargo will be taken out, so that she can be beached and a new wheel, which she carries, can be put on.—Coast Mail.

## New Logging Road.

It was given out last week on good authority that a logging road is to be run up Cunningham creek to get at the valuable timber in that section.

Although it is not known definitely yet who the builder is to be, it is known that it is either to be the Simpson Lumber Company or the Dean Lumber Company; but as yet which of these firms cannot be said. Both companies have lumber up this creek. The construction of the Cunningham Creek road has long contemplated, but for some reason the matter has been held off to await developments. This proposed road will be a great help to this place, as it means that at least two and possibly more camps are to be put in, and this will bring much additional trade to this place.—Recall.
