Suction Dredge Next.

An Appropriation of \$50,000 to be Recommended.

Oregonian News Bureau, Washington, Nov. 6.—In his annual report General Mackenzie, chief of engineers, made one exception to the rule prohibiting recommendations of new work. He recommended an appropriation of \$50,000 to build a dredge for use on the bars at the entrance to Tillamook, Yaquina and Coos Bay, and at the entrance to the Siuslaw and Coquille rivers. General Mackenzie had this to say about the dredge, for which the last Congress refused to make an appropriation: "Navigation in these harbors is often greatly delayed by the forming of shoals, the material deposited in most instances being of such nature that it cannot be easily handled with a dipper dredge. It is estimated that a combination of suction and dipper dredge could be advantageously used, and so constructed that it could be taken from harbor to harbor as needs arises demand. "The cost of such a plant with two dump scows would be approximately \$50,000, and it is thought that the necessity for its use will fully justify the expenditure, the funds to be provided by a special appropriation, operating expenses to be paid from the funds available for the maintenance of the harbor upon which it may be used. There are no private dredging plants at any of the coast harbors mentioned, and the expense of taking a plant from the Columbia river with the attendant risk in towing would make the cost of dredging prohibitive if undertaken by contract.

It is also worth noticing that in this open activity and avowed intentions have developed since the great success of the Lewis and Clark Fair was assured. That helped, but Hill's breaking was the main cause. Mr. Harriman is not idle; not he. He is building into Wallowa. He is helping to build to Lewiston. He is building to Coos Bay. He is to spend many more millions still on the main lines of his Pacific coast roads. He has set aside \$4,100,000 for some definite new line of portion of line in Oregon not yet disclosed. In one way or another he will get into central Oregon or the Klamath country, or both, and he will not dally along about it for years. Many millions, tens of millions, will be spent in the very near future in Oregon and the Columbia-Snake-Clearwater region, and in reaching this water-grade route Portland, Oregon has been re-discovered, re-explored, and is just beginning a new life.—Portland Journal.

The Harriman water line has put on two more steamers on the Portland-San Francisco run.

The initial number of Marshfield's new paper, the Advertiser, was issued last week. It is full of news and is typographically up-to-date. There are now four papers in Marshfield, and room for just two at the present time, but the Advertiser will be in the front rank by reason of merit if the first issue is a sample of what future numbers are to be.

Two Lose Licenses.

Captain and Third Officer Found Negligent on St. Paul Wreck.
Captain Clem Randall, master of the steamer St. Paul, which was wrecked at Point Gorda, October 5th, and Third Officer William Holmes, have had their licenses suspended for 18 months by Supervising Inspector Birmingham. Captain Birmingham held that they were negligent at the time the St. Paul was wrecked. He also declared that the skipper was unskillful, or he would not have allowed the vessel to get so far in toward the shore, almost 15 miles out of the course taken by the coasters at that time of year.

Shooting at Marshfield

Chas. Hunsaker Shot by Lorenzo Emerson Sunday.
Lorenza Emerson lies in jail and Chas Hunsaker lies in the Marshfield General Hospital as the result of the shooting affair which took place Sunday evening in the cabin on north Front street where the two men have been baching. It seems to have been a case of too much red liquor. The two men got into a jangle, and Emerson blazed away at Hunsaker with a 38 calibre revolver. The bullet struck the middle of his front and slid around under the skin to his back, where it was extracted later by Dr. Mings. Emerson took to the hills, but returned later to his cabin, where he was picked up by a deputy whom Marshal Carter had posted there. His examination will take place when Hunsaker is able to be brought into court, which will be in a day or two.—Coast Mail.

Body Found.

Superintendent Ross, of the Bay City mill, telephoned to Marshal Carter that a girl going over from here in a boat had seen the body of a man floating in the bay. Coroner Mings started out on a hunt for the body, but had not returned, at last accounts.—Coast Mail.
