Coos County has many timber which are adapted to the use of paper mills, and the establishment of one industry of this nature will bring prosperity.—Coquille Record.

Liquor Dealers Will Try Initiative Too.
By means of the initiative, the liquor dealers of the state hope to secure an amendment to the local option law at the general election next June. Petitions are being circulated demanding that an amendment to the law, similar to that proposed by the Jayne bill at the last session of the legislature, be submitted to the voters.

The proposed amendment would give to each precinct in the state local self-government in the matter of prohibition. No precinct could be made "dry" by the vote of the adjoining precincts, nor of the county in which it is situated.

Another important feature is the provision that 30 per cent instead of 50 per cent of the voters are required to call an election in any precinct, group of precincts, or county, on the question of prohibition.

The petitions were drawn under the direction of the Brewers' and Wholesale Liquor Dealers' Association, and are being circulated by members of the Royal Arch, an organization of the retail liquor dealers.
