Oregon Fir Costs a Lot in Iowa.

Coos County Man Says People Pay Twenty-Six Dollars a Thousand and For It.

[Portland Journal.]
 "I have been on a tour through Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado, and I have come back to Oregon with a great realization of what this state's timber resources mean," said John Peart, of Coos county, who is in Portland awaiting departure of the first boat for Coquille City. He is engaged in the coal and timber business there.
 "It is a good thing for Oregon men to go out through the country and see conditions in other states. It makes them appreciate the greatness of their own state, and the many opportunities here for a progressive man to do well. Nearly the entire length of my journey in the middle west I did not see a tree worth considering. Down in Iowa they are paying \$22 to \$23 per thousand feet for Oregon fir and pine. I stopped some time in northern Iowa, and noted the building operations there. A man of my acquaintance bought a dressed board of Oregon fir at the lumber yard, and paid 8 cents a foot for it."
 Mr. Peart has extensive holdings of coal and timber in Coos county. He says the coal is a good quality of lignite, and that Coos will, with transportation facilities promised by the Drain line of the Southern Pacific, experience a great awakening commercially. The coal lies in easily workable veins. One has a thickness of seven feet, and he has opened it with a tunnel showing 137 feet of the vein.

Senator Mitchell Dead.
 U. S. Senator John Hipple Mitchell is dead. The end came at 11:30 a.m. last Friday, at the Good Samaritan Hospital in Portland. The direct cause of death was a violent hemorrhage, the result of having four teeth extracted. Owing to the profuse loss of blood, the Senator's constitution was unable to withstand the strain on his system, already weakened by diabetes and the mental worry under which he had struggled for months. He lost consciousness at 8 o'clock Thursday night, at which time diabetic coma set in, and from that hour until the end the veteran statesman never again came to his senses. Blood-poisoning allied itself with his other afflictions to hasten death.

Council to License Business Men.

Revenue Needed to Pay Running Expenses of the Town.

Bandon, like many other towns which in the past have depended upon saloon licenses to pay expenses, finds that since the local option law went into effect, some other means must be devised for raising revenue. The \$1,200 per annum which was formerly paid by the saloons here made a fund that would meet current expenses. Now that the saloons are closed, the town council has drafted an ordinance to place a license on the various places of business.
 The ordinance, which is printed below, has been up for the second reading and will come up again tomorrow (Friday) night, Dec. 15th, for third reading and final passage, at which time, objections to the ordinance, if any, will be heard. Business men are invited to attend the meeting.

Ordinance No. 73.
 An ordinance to provide for licensing and regulating theatre, show or other public exhibition, bowling alley, billiard table or other table upon which games are played with balls and cues; or to engage in or carry on any business, trade, occupation or profession hereinafter enumerated, without first having obtained a license therefor.

THE TOWN OF BANDON DOES ORDAIN
 AS FOLLOWS:
 Sec. I. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to keep for pay, within the corporate limits of the town of Bandon, any theatre, show or other public exhibition; any bowling alley, billiard table, pigeon hole table or other table upon which games are played with balls and cues, or to engage in or carry on any business, trade or occupation or profession hereinafter provided. No peddler shall vend, sell or retail at private sale, any goods, wares or merchandise, unless the same are products of this State. No auctioneer shall sell any goods, wares or merchandise at public vendue, unless such person or persons shall have first obtained a license therefor in the manner herein after provided.
 Sec. II. Any person or persons applying for license, as required by this ordinance, shall pay to the town treasurer the amount due from said license and take receipt therefor, specifying the amount so paid, the business intended to be pursued, and the length of time for which it is to be issued.
 Sec. III. On presentation of such receipt to the Recorder, he shall issue a license in accordance with the terms thereof.
 Sec. IV. No license shall be transferred, nor shall any license be remitted or commuted.
 Sec. V. All licenses issued by the Town Recorder shall expire on the first day of January, April, July or October, and shall not be for a term of less than three months.
 Sec. VI. The following businesses, trades, occupations and professions shall be licensed, and the following monthly rates charged therefor, viz:

 Any store carrying three lines or more of goods above mentioned, shall be classed as a general merchandise store and licensed at \$15.00 per month.
 Sec. VII. Any person or persons doing business within the town under this ordinance will be required to pay the license above stated on each variety of goods carried, excepting notions, tobacco and cigars. PROVIDED: It shall be and is hereby made the duty of the recorder, before issuing any license to any business house when the grade of its license is regulated by the variety of articles sold, to qualify such applicant in writing with regard to such sales, and to issue a license accordingly.
 Sec. VIII. It is hereby made the duty of the town treasurer, on the 28th days of December, March, June and September, of each year, to be in the post office for, or hand to each licensed payer a notice printed in plain type and to the effect that his or her license will expire on the first day of the ensuing month and he or she must procure a new license before the fourth day of said ensuing month, and that no further notice will be given.
 Sec. IX. If any person or persons shall engage in or carry on any business, trade, occupation or profession, or keep or have any thing above mentioned without having obtained a license therefor agreeably to the provisions of this ordinance, he or she shall, upon conviction thereof before the town recorder, be fined in a sum not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the town jail not more than fifty days or both such fine and imprisonment.
 Sec. X. It shall be and is hereby made the duty of the town marshal, to immediately proceed, as provided by the laws and ordinances of the town of Bandon, against any and all persons who shall on the 4th days of January, April, July and October of each year, be found carrying on within said town of Bandon, without having first obtained a license therefor, any business, trade, occupation or profession for which a license has been or may hereafter be provided by an ordinance of said town of Bandon, and at any time between said dates, after notice, either verbal or written, given by said marshal to any party violating any of the terms of this ordinance.
 Sec. XI. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.
 XII. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and virtue on and after the first day of January, 1906.
