STEEL FROM BLACK SAND.

Since the first experiments on a working scale made by Dr. David T. Day at the Mining building at the exposition grounds, when steel was produced from the magnetite of the black sand in the electrical furnace, much interest has been manifested.

Similar trials in other hands have shown corresponding results. The experimental stage is, of course, not yet passed, and much remains to be demonstrated.

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If electric furnaces can be set up and operated as cheaply as Dr. Day says they can, and steel, worth from 50 to 60 dollars per ton be made, there ought to be fortunes in the beach sands of Curry County, which contain more gold and platinum than other beaches, besides unlimited quantities of magnetite iron (black sand).

Moreover it will be found that the deposits on the beach are practically unlimited, as fast as worked out will be renewed by the new bodies of sand thrown in and concentrated by the heavy ocean storms, just as our beach gold mines have been renewed wherever the surf can act upon them.

With the coming of the railroad, the working of our beach mines and the making of steel will certainly assume gigantic proportions along this coast, and now is the time to take time by the forelock.—Tribune.
