Prosper.

The gasoline schooner Satayome has been chartered by Suddup & Christenson, to run here, and is expected after New Year.

The schooner Ruby is expected to tow up this trip from San Francisco, and will be due the last of the week.

The C. T. Hill has sailed from San Pedro for the Prosper Mill.

E. Henckendorff returned from San Francisco last Saturday, having come by way of Mariposa. He is pleased with the present outlook for a busy year in ship building, and, as now rumored, has the contract to build a steam schooner for Suddup & Christenson of San Francisco, work to begin after New Year, and reported to be of the following dimensions: 180 feet long, 38 feet beam, and depth 13 feet.

90 Cars of Rails for New Road.

The RECORDER has just received the following from Drain:

90 cars of steel between here and Chicago for Coos Bay road. Big gang here cleaning up yard, getting ready to receive it.

Ordinance No. 73.

An ordinance to provide for licensing and regulating theatre, show or other public exhibition, bowling alley, billiard table or other table upon which games are played with balls and cues, or to engage in or carry on any business, trade, occupation or profession hereinafter enumerated, without first having obtained a license therefor.

THE TOWN OF BANDON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. I. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to keep for pay, within the corporate limits of the town of Bandon, any theatre, show or other public exhibition, any bowling alley, billiard table, pigeon hole table or other table upon which games are played with balls and cues, or to engage in or carry on any business, trade or occupation or profession hereinafter provided. No peddler shall vend, sell or retail, at private sale, any goods, wares or merchandise. No auctioneer shall sell any goods, wares or merchandise at public vendue, unless such person or persons shall have first obtained a license therefor in the manner hereinafter provided.

Sec. II. Any person or persons applying for license, as required by this ordinance, shall pay to the town treasurer the amount due from said license and take a receipt therefor, specifying the amount so paid, the business intended to be pursued, and the length of time for which it is to be issued.

Sec. III. On presentation of such receipt to the recorder, he shall issue a license in accordance with the terms thereof.

Sec. IV. No license shall be transferred, nor shall any license be reissued or commuted.

Sec. V. All licenses issued by the Town Recorder, shall expire on the first days of January, April, July or October, and shall not be for a term of less than three months.

Sec. VI. The following businesses, trades, occupations and professions shall be licensed, and the following monthly rates charged therefor, viz:

Harness and saddle shops, 1.00
Hotels, 5.00

Sec. VII. Any person or persons doing business within the town under this ordinance will be required to pay the license above stated on each variety of goods carried, excepting notions, tobacco and cigars. PROVIDED: It shall be and is hereby made the duty of the recorder, before issuing any license to any business house when the grade of its license is regulated by the variety of articles sold, to qualify each applicant in writing with regard to such sales, and to issue a license accordingly.

Sec. VIII. It is hereby made the duty of the town treasurer, on the 28th days of December, March, June and September, of each year, to deposit in the post office for, or hand to such licensed payer a notice printed in plain type and to the effect that his or her license will expire on the first day of the ensuing month and he or she must prepare a new license before the fourth day of said ensuing month, and that no farther notice will be given.

Sec. IX. If any person or persons shall engage in or carry on any business, trade, occupation or profession, or keep or have any thing above mentioned without having obtained a license therefor, or in violation of the provisions of this ordinance, he or she shall, upon conviction thereof before the town recorder, be fined in a sum not less than ten nor more than one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the town jail not more than twenty days or both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. X. It shall be and is hereby made the duty of the town marshal to immediately proceed, as provided by the laws and or-

dinances of the town of Bandon, against any and all persons who shall on the 4th days of January, April, July and October of each year, be found carrying on within said town of Bandon, without first having obtained a license therefor, any business, trade, occupation or profession for which a license has been or may hereafter be provided by any ordinance of said town of Bandon, at any time between said dates, after notice, either verbal or written, given by said Marshal to any party violating any of the terms of this ordinance.

Sec. XI. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. XII. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and virtue, on or after the first day of January, 1906.
