MARINE.

Dec. 29.—Schr Ruby, Korth, from San Francisco. Steamer Alliance will sail for Eureka from Marshfield at service of tide, Thursday, p.m., Jan. 4th.

The three-masted schooner Advance attempted to sail into the river last Friday afternoon and struck on the sand spit near the light-house.

The life-saving crew were on the scene in a few minutes and ran a line from the schooner to the tug, but the line was too small and in the attempt to pull her off, it parted.

Before another line was procured the tide was ebbing and no further attempt was made to get her off until the next tide, when a hawser was fastened to the south jetty and the crew on the schooner had worked her out about twenty feet when the line parted on a splice.

As the tides have been smaller each day, no further attempt has been made to pull the schooner off, as she is resting easy on a bed of sand.

Her rudder is gone, but otherwise she is not badly damaged, and there is no sign of a leak.

The Coquille Mill & Tug Co. have put a donkey engine aboard, and fastened a wire cable to the south jetty, and expect to pull her into the river the first of the week when there is a high tide.

About thirty minutes before the Advance started in, the sch. Ruby sailed in safely. The Advance followed but got too far to the north, lost her headway, and drifted on to the sand spit with sails flapping.
